They narrowed the margin in the second when catcher Kyle Hawthorne slammed a solo home run over the leftfield wall for his ninth fourbagger of the season. That ties the school record set by Byron Barber back in 1961.

The Aggies scored one in the fourth on an RBI double by first baseman Rodney Hodde, and took the lead in the fifth when second baseman Randy Woodruff singled, advanced to third on a throwing error by Rosenthal that put shortstop Tommy Larsen on second and scored on a wild pitch.

Larsen scored when leftfielder Gary Bryant looped a single into center field.

The three-run homer by Lentsch off Pockrus gave Minnesota the edge they needed to hang its first win over A&M in three year

Pockrus was charged with the loss, making him 2-1 on the year. McDonald pitched the first 5½ innings, giving up six hits, walking five and striking out seven.

The Gophers collected seven total hits, led by third baseman Dan McEachern, who was 2-for-2 with a

by third baseman Dave Engle, who was 4-for-4 with four RBI's and scored four runs. He also hit for the 'cycle', meaning he clubbed a single, double, triple and a home run in his four at-bats.

The Trojans touched Aggie starter Perry Swanson for five runs on seven hits through the first five frames and held a 6-2 lead going into the bottom of the sixth.

A&M got back into the game at that point on a two-out, three-run home run by right fielder Shelton McMath over the scoreboard in left-center field to cut the margin to 6-5. It was McMath's fourth roundtripper of the season.

Chandler brought in junior Mark Thurmond to hurl the final two in-nings. Senior Jim McWilliams had turned in two frames on the mound in relief of Swanson and yielded only one unearned run.

After walking the first man he faced, Thurmond served up a gopher ball that Engle belted over the right field wall to complete the "cycle," and provide USC with 8-5




