ained. Without this ratio, almost no freshmen would be able to live on campus since off-campus upperclassmen fill the waiting lists. Spaces are available for living on campus in the spring. At no time, however, should any resident be "kicked out" of his room for other students.

What other changes or programs would you work for?

General dorm room and lounge improvements are a priority and should include laundry machines, Xerox copiers, ice machines, and recreational equipment. One of the Commons' TV rooms could easily be converted into a quiet, coed study area. Outdoor basketball and volleyball courts would alleviate overcrowded indoor courts and be available just for fun. More on-campus parking should be demanded since an intracampus bus route is available to day students and since "red" parking has been expanded to include sophomores. Dorm areas should provide campaign rallies or hours to provide alternatives for meeting candidates other than continuous door-to-door knocking that disturbs residents. What changes in University Rules and Regulations or the Student Body Constitution would you like to see?

This year, many changes in the University Rules and Regulations (blue book) were proposed by the student senate and the faculty and staff. Presently, the University Rules and Regulations Committee is reviewing these proposals and forwarding its recommendations to the administration. Until the final product (next year's Blue Book) is released, I cannot factually answer this question. Likewise, a new student body constitution will be presented for the student's approval in April. I feel that it is a workable document, but time will tell.

If a rule you believe is unfair is challenged, how would you go about changing it?

In proposing a change in rules or regulations dealing with any aspect of Texas A&M, I would use four steps: 1) Research — hold hearings, interviews, etc. with the people involved in the change; 2) Analysis — screen the research data for its pros and cons, future implications, etc.; 3) Evaluate — make a judgment whether or not a change is necessary and/or appropriate; and 4) Implementation — take appropriate action on the issue in the Student Senate. In short, kick a few tails and get some action.

Will you try to foster camaraderie among off-campus students? If so, how?

Yes, I feel one of the main problems of off-campus students is meet-

Another idea OSCA is presently studying is the possibility of shuttle busing during football games to reduce the parking problem.

Will you try to foster camaraderie among off-campus students? If so, how?

Off-campus students do not share enough group activities. I would encourage the OSCA to sponsor zone activities such as intramural participation, parties, and service drives. Activities such as these could promote a sense of group identity.

The major problem among off-campus students is a lack of group identity which in the past has led to general apathy. Creative solutions must be found. One method would be through organized zone activities. It should also be possible to foster among off-campus students an awareness of our common concerns.

How would you like to see the shuttle bus system changed?

A well thought out, thorough study should be done to determine how to improve the effectiveness of the shuttle bus system. Concurrent with this should be a study of student opinion on and feasibility of shuttle bus service to football games and on weekends.
