## Disaster memories

COLUMBUS, Ohio — To Frank Goldsmith, the sinking of the Titanic is more than an item of history — it's a memory, undimmed after the 66 years that have passed since he survived it.

Goldsmith, now 75, was 9 years old on April 15, 1912 — a year emigrant on his way to Detroit, England with parents and friends start a new life. They were aboard the Titanic on the luxury liner's voyage.

The retired Air Force worker, one of a handful who survived the sinking of the ship, one of his worst sea disasters. It claimed 15 lives, including his father's.

"Our cabin was across the ship from second class — near the funnel of the ship," he said, "his first memory of that fateful night was 'the sound of nothing.'"

"I was calmly dressing myself," he said. "As I was lacing my shoe, there was a rap on the door. Mother opened it and the boat came in and looked at the ceiling. He told us to put on life preservers because we might have to go on the life boats. I thought we were really lucky."

For days, younger passengers aboard the Titanic had been told to get into a life boat to play, each time, a crew member would then away.

"Five of us, the Goldsmiths, young boy and his older brother slowly began walking forward, flight through the second-class area to the promenade deck. The boat was directing us to the back of the ship," he said. "There we parted from Dad."

That's when Goldsmith's father hugged his mother, then patted her shoulder and said, "So long, Frankie, I'll see you later."

The boy and his mother boarded the last boat to be lowered from the ship.

"For the first time, I began to get upset," Goldsmith remembers. The ladies were crying. Tears were pouring down their cheeks and he began to be anxious about Dad.

The rocking boat put the boy to sleep and when he woke again, it was complete daylight and the ship was being rowed to a rescue ship.

They learned on the ship that Goldsmith's father had not been rescued.

Goldsmith now has three grandchildren and a great-grandchild.

"Yes," he said, "they like to hear the story."

## Patient rights topic of court

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court and the judicial system generally face a growing list of suits on behalf of the mentally ill.

The high court Monday agreed to rule in a Texas case on the amount of proof required before a state can commit a person against his will to a mental hospital for an indefinite period.

In a separate action, the court is standing a decision that New Hampshire can compel inclusion of mental illness in group health insurance policies without violating either federal law or the Constitution.

Administrators of six New England health and welfare plans wanted a reversal of an opinion of the 1st U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which said federal laws supersede state laws in this field.

According to the Blue Cross of other states requiring coverage, mental and/or emotional disorders include California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Illinois, Louisiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New York, North Dakota, Oregon, Vermont, Virginia and West Virginia.

The Texas case was brought on behalf of Frank Addington, committed to a state hospital in 1976 after Galveston County jury found "beyond a reasonable doubt and convincing evidence" he was mentally ill.

An intermediate appeals court imposed the stricter "beyond a reasonable doubt" standard used in criminal trials. Texas' Supreme Court accepted the less rigorous standard.

The Supreme Court will hear the case later this year and decide the written opinion.

In June 1965 Justice Potter Stewart ruled for a unanimous court in a landmark Florida case that state cannot constitutionally commit against his will and without treatment a non-dangerous individual who is capable of surviving safely in freedom.

Since then the justices have been asked to look into the rights of a child whose parents want to commit him. This issue is now scheduled for a second round of arguments in fall.

In other actions the court: — Agreed to examine state officials to automatically suspend motor vehicle license of any driver driving suspect who refuses to take breathalyzer test.

— Agreed to rule on whether other states must show "probable cause" for seeking extradition.

— Refused to order President Carter to postpone the Panama Canal treaties until their legality is examined.
