The Texas lawyer was president of outh Texas College of Law in 74-76 and is president-emeritus of institution. Bracewell was ected to the Texas House of Rep-sentatives in 1947 and two years er made a successful bid for the exas Senate where he served 10 ears. He was president pro-tem of he Senate in 1957, and in 1969-71 vas chairman of the Texas Water velopment Board.

He has been a counselor since 964 with the Texas A&M Research coundation, of which he became a stee in 1967 and board chairman 1976. He is a founding member of exas A&M's President's Endowed holars Program and served on the sociation of Former Students

Lindsey, a 1944 Texas A&M aduate, is partner of a Houston insurance agency bearing his name. Known for many behind-the-scenes contributions to the University, he is a past president (1964) of the Association of Former Students and so a founding member of the Present's Endowed Scholars Program. He too has been a Research Foundation counselor since 1964, and a le in the foundation trustee since 1969.

Lindsey also serves on the Prairie View A&M University Foundation Board and is on the executive comnittee for the South Texas College After reg Law Board of Trustees.




