UNITED NATIONS — Cuban Vice President Carlos Rafael Rodriquez, with demonstrator's chants of "Cubans out of Africa" echoing in his ears, told the United Nations today that President Carter's charge that Cuba was involved in the rebel invasion of Zaire was "absolutely

But Rodriguez, without mentioning the continent by name, defended Cuban military presence in Africa as necessary "to safeguard the independence of other peoples faced with imperialist aggression.
