# Corps teaches cadets leadership

College gives students the opportunity to acquire more education than is outlined in an institution's catalog.

Technical and honor societies and other student organizations offer chances for leadership and chances to broaden one's outlook.

At Texas A&M University, the Corps of Cadets requires students to enhance personal qualities that pay dividends mostly after graduation. The Corps' basic premise is that to lead, one must first learn to follow.

Even cadets who do not plan to go into the military learn lessons that are valuable later in business and industry.

Few other colleges graduates are employed with the background of having led a group of 10 to 15 others, much less 40 to 60 and more cadets, as have company-level and higher Corps commanders.

Robert J. Kamensky, 1978-79 Corps commander from Washington, D.C., exemplifies them. He will be the Corps' top cadet commissioned officer with responsibility for more than 2,000 cadets.

The son of a State Department employee, Kamensky began preparation for the job as a junior and Corps sergeant major.

"I took my third Naval ROTC cruise between semesters," the nuclear engineering major and Navy officer candidate said, "so I could take some summer courses and help prepare for the Corps' return next month."

The 1975 San Angelo Central High School graduate has charge of a twice-a-week Texas A&M traditions program presented before summer New Student Conference. Other cadets in summer school including the new Corps deputy commander, Scott Patton of Sherman, and the 1978-79 sergeant major, Mike Formby of Houston, pitch in.

After classes, they attend student conference sessions to answer questions about the Corps. Cadets tour new students and the parents through the campus area.

Along with 30 to 35 hours a week study, Kamensky also works in the commandant's office "which includes being a 'gopher' now and then," he grinned. "I go for this go for that."

Not an "all work" type though, the Navy scholarship cadet whose goal is the Navy's nuclear power program, has time for tennis, weight-lifting and jogging.

His December-January cruise was as a junior officer on a fast attack submarine out of Subic Bay in the Philippines.

"We were underway 18 days under water most of the time," he said. Ten days in port at Bangor revealed the world-wide nature of the "Aggie fraternity."

Kamensky met a Class of 1980 graduate, a St. Louis jewelry buyer who took him to dinner.

Such selling points aid new student conference recruiting, he said, the places we can build the Corps, he said.

# A&M computer team to monitor hearings

America's small farmers will have their "day in court" today and on four other occasions in August and September. Texas A&M University will serve as court reporter.

Starting in Montgomery, Ala., the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Community Services Administration begin the first of five regional conferences aimed at pinpointing specific problems affecting small farmers in an age of corporate giants in agriculture.

The two-day meetings will be held at regional sites starting with Montgomery, July 25-26; Des Moines, Iowa, Aug. 16-17; LaGrande, Ore., Aug. 22-23; Portland, Maine., Aug. 30-31; and Albuquerque, N.M., Sept. 6-7.

Monitoring and reporting of the small farm conferences will be done by a team of computer scientists headed by Dr. Joseph Massey at Texas A&M and Dr. Clyde Faskick of the U.S. Forest Service. They will monitor problem areas of credit and capital, production and management, marketing, quality of life and government relations. In all, 65 farmers will rate the problems they feel affect them the most. From information, we can identify problems that are unique to the region and those problems that are common to each.

The University team was selected to monitor the conferences due its speed in reporting farmers' opinions. Using Texas A&M's Amiga computer and special program they are able to produce a preliminary regional report while the day meeting is still in session, a summary report at the conclusion of the five meetings.
