Tuition tax credit may pass yet

WASHINGTON — If you're a college student — or footing the bill or one — you may be eligible for a ederal tax credit under bills passed by the House and Senate.

The amount will depend on a House-Senate conference, yet to be held, to negotiate differences beween the measures.

That conference also will determine whether the final bill includes tuition credits for elementary and secondary education in private and parochial schools. The House says es. The Senate, by a 56-41 vote after three days of emotional de-bate, last week voted no.

But whether there are any tax credits for any level of education also will depend on President Carter, who has threatened to veto

He prefers to expand the existing college student grant and loan program. The Senate is considering one version of Carter's proposal — to make an estimated additional 1.5 million students eligible for college education grants.

The margin by which the Senate

approved its tuition credits bill, 65-27, was more than the two-thirds najority needed to override a veto. The House margin, 237-158, was
