Gulf ports need improving to keep worldwide pace

worldwide trends, according to a Texas A&M University report.

Other maritime nations are shipping cargo in very large commercial craft (VLCC) and ultra large commercial craft (ULCC), obtaining important cost savings

The foreign vessels carry five to eight times more cargo and operate out of onshore deepwater ports. Most cannot operate in Gulf of Mexico ports

Very few such ports are found in he United States

"The shortfall in U.S. port facilities capable of handling these deep draft vessels, coupled with a apidly growing volume of imports nd exports of bulk commodities, has ulted in a critical need for im-

Just a few years ago, the U.S. could boast that its ports were capable of accommodating the largest ships in service," noted Dr. John B. Herbich. "Today, other nations have moved considerably ahead in both port construction and shipbuilding."

The onshore deepwater port, pursued almost exclusively in Europe, is the answer here, he says.

Research by J. Wallace Berriman and Herbich recommend improved channel designs for onshore deepwater ports at Corpus Christi, Freeport, Galveston and Port Arthur

Herbich chairs the Ocean Engineering Program of Texas A&M's Civil Engineering Department, and directs the Center for Dredging changes in American foreign trade

Only low visibility conditions which make navigation hazardous would be a drawback, Berriman and Herbich note.

Other reasons for onshore deepwater ports are projected growth in oil imports and refining, and sizable increases in seaborne movement of petroleum products between processing and consuming regions. Also, depletion of domestic reserves of critical materials such as iron ore probably will lead to more imports in

future years. The engineers pointed out that policies will likely emphasize worldwide marketing of coal and agricultural products.

"Since the economy of transporta-tion tends to favor the use of VLCC's appears that deepwater facilities for dry bulk commodities and pet-roleum products will become highly desirable," Herbich said.

Port designs they suggest are based on a top vessel size of 265,000 deadweight tons. Savings provided by larger ships is negligible, the report states






