Ex-fire chief Dorman receives certificate

Fourteen Texas Engineering Extension personnel, including the retiring William B. "Cotton" Dorman, were cited Tuesday for service at Texas A&M University.

Service pins for from five to 30 years were presented.

Dorman, associated with the Fire Protection Training Division more than 30 years received his retirement certificate from TEEEX Director James R. Bradley.

Dorman, former fire chief at Meridian, trained at the Texas Firemen's Training School and became a guest instructor in 1953. He joined the staff fulltime in 1965.

Dorman was in charge of guest instructor registration the last few years after traveling Texas as an instructor.

"There were only a few of the 600 guest instructors for the recent school that Cotton didn't greet by first name," noted Chief Henry D. Smith, division head at TEEEX.

The retiring fire training instructor was presented a plaque from the school's instructors, a camera by co-workers and a remembrance book of personal messages.

He was also presented the first guest instructor invitation for the 50th Firemen's Training School in 1979.

Sharp sus on NFPA Fire Service board

William H. Sharp, associate training specialist with the Texas Engineering Extension Service, Texas A&M University, has been re-elected to the board of directors of the National Fire Protection Association's Fire Service Section.

Elected by the 4,000 members of the NFPA Fire Service Section, Sharp is to serve a three-

year term on the seven-member board.

Vietnamese refugee wins intern's award

Tom Lee, South Vietnamese refugee and a graduate student in the Texas A&M Institute of Statistics, has been honored by a Civil Service Commission bureau as one of two outstanding summer interns.

Lee, 38, a former military officer, worked with other statisticians this past summer at the Bureau of Personnel Management Systems developing math models for ascertaining the status of persons in the government work force.

Borman is new head of Ed. Psych. Dept.

Dr. Christopher A. Borman has been named head of the Educational Psychology Department at Texas A&M University.

He succeeds Dr. Arthur Roach, who requested reassignment to full-time teaching and research earlier this year.

Borman, who holds three degrees from Indiana University, has been with Texas A&M since 1970. He began his career as assistant professor of educational psychology and has since been named director of the Center for Career Development and Occupational Preparation.

Grant for professor to lecture in Tehran

Dr. Robert Sanford Cornish, associate professor of urban

and regional planning at A&M University, has awarded a Fulbright-Hays grant to teach a year in Iran.

The grant was awarded by the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Program.

He will be lecturing at the University of Tehran in urban regional planning, comparative planning, methodology and techniques and in the contemporary American planning. He will return to A&M next fall.

'Dirt digger' retires after researching

Dr. Hans Brawand, 27-year veteran of agricultural research retired this week amid acclamations at the Soil and Crop Sciences Building at Texas A&M University.

Brawand, who served as a research soil physicist at the Texas Research Foundation in Dallas, was honored with a certificate and appreciation presented by Dr. Dudley L. Peterson, assistant director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and Dr. M.E. Bloodworth, of the Soil and Crop Sciences Department.

The Swiss-born scientist joined the Texas A&M staff on the campus in 1974, where he worked in soil moisture conservation, soil structure, plant nutrition and farming systems relationships.

Brawand plans to remain at the College Station area.

"The study of the soil and its relationship to the environment is the foundation of agriculture," Brawand said. "It is a field that has maintained its importance. We must continue to study and improve the soil to make it strong and productive."

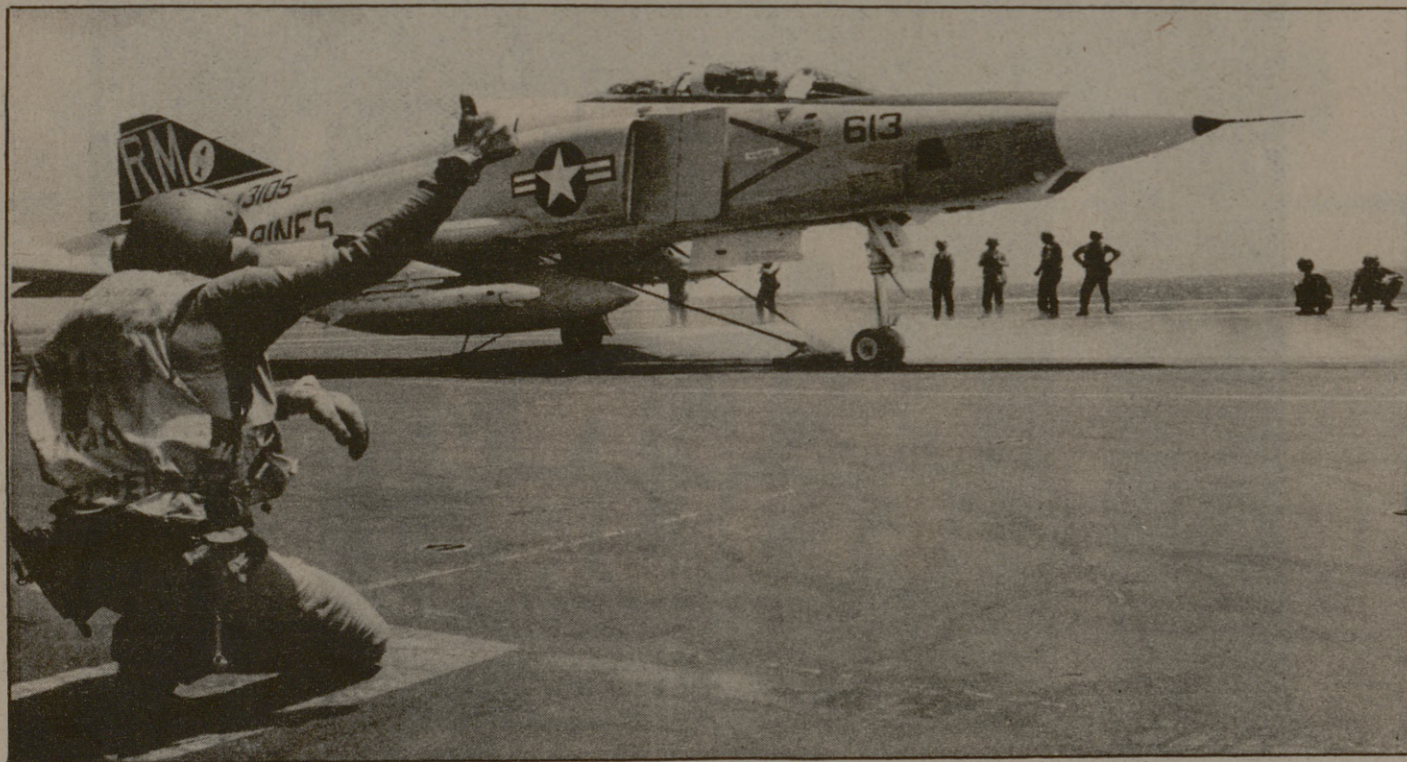

Law of sea seminar for next week

The technological, social, and ethical implications of the "law of the sea" will be the topic of a seminar at Texas A&M University Tuesday and Wednesday.

The seminar, co-sponsored by the Texas A&M University United Methodist Church, will discuss topics such as the extension of offshore jurisdiction miles by many nations, the depletion of the oceans' resources and the role of a unified law of the sea.
