Charges for medication possible at health center

The University Health Center may begin charging students for medication they receive due to rising operating costs. The health center now charges students a \$15 health center fee per semester which pays for any medication they are given. Claude Goswick, center director, said he intends to submit the proposal to charge students for medication to Dr. John Koldus, vice presi-

dent for student services, next month. Koldus said that the health center's medical expenses are costing more than the \$15 per student. "Our alternatives are to reduce services or provide other sources of income, so we're looking at the partial user fee," he said. "I'm receptive to the proposal and I'd like to see what he's talking about specifically," Koldus said. The proposal would also have to be approved by Texas A&M University

President Jarvis Miller and Board of Regents, since it relates to fees, Koldus said. "Our income is relatively low because \$15 is the maximum we can charge students by law for a health center fee," said Goswick. "We could go to the legislature and ask them to raise the fee. This increased cost would affect those who never set foot in the health center," Goswick said. The health center director said that charging for medication would be letting those who actually use the health center pay for it. Also, Goswick said the students would be paying in exact proportion to the amount that they used the health center. He said this might cut down on unnecessary use of the health center, which, he said, happens occasionally.

The health center will lose a sizeable \$85,000 a year as of September when it will no longer be a requirement for university employees get physicals. Texas A&M paid the health center \$20 for each physical. Goswick said the proposal to charge students for medication not being made because of the policy toward physicals. "If we hadn't lost the money the physicals we would still have had additional income," Goswick said. He added that the health center budgeted for the money for the physicals for this year, but there was still a \$10,000 deficit before the money was taken away. Goswick said that cutting the fee is not a feasible alternative. "We've hardly cut our physician staff, we don't even have enough as it is. I also said that the health center is quite heavily on the nurses to have, for evaluating the patients."

Goswick said that under the proposal, students would not be charged for over-the-counter medicine like that received in the cold clinic. "Our biggest medication expense is for prescription medication," Goswick said.

Goswick said that if a charge for medication was initiated in the pharmacy, then the pharmacy would operate on a break-even basis. "When that happens, we could afford to stock much more medication that we can't stock now. We would be supplying a much broader supply of medication at a convenient time than it would cost at the store," Goswick said that students would be charged for what the medication cost plus their cost of dispensing.

Goswick said that in the past there is a possibility that students might be charged for X-rays and other services also.

"In the past it has been a matter of pride that we don't charge students for medication; just the \$15 health center fee a semester. If the way expenses have skyrocketed, it can't stay that way now," Goswick said. Goswick said that health center at other universities make additional charges for medication.

Dr. Paul Trickett, health center director at the University of Texas said, "We've always charged students for medication in the 11 years I've been here."

"We have our own pharmacy at the center, which provides medication for students at a reasonable charge; less than downtown," Trickett said.

Dr. James Whitehurst, health center director at the University of Houston, said that they have also charged students for medication and they also have a pharmacy which supplies medication to students at a "cheaper rate than elsewhere."

Like the other two universities, Texas Tech charges students for medication they receive. Texas Tech also has a pharmacy in clinic, which offers medication to students at rates competitive with the community. Elizabeth Pound, assistant director of the health clinic, said.
