

# Oilers defeat Browns

CLEVELAND — The Cleveland Browns claimed an official's call Sunday took a victory away from them for the second straight week, but statistics proved they deserved to lose the game.

Houston Oiler kicker Toni Fritsch kicked a 19-yard field goal with 14 seconds left to give his team a 23-13 win over the Browns. The winning kick was set up by a disguised 24-yard pass from Dan Pastorini to Ken Burrough.

Burrough leaped for the ball with Cleveland cornerback Ron Bolton and the two came down fighting for the pigskin. The officials ruled Burrough had possession, sparking a melee and can-throwing melee by Cleveland fans sitting in the east end zone grandstand.

The disruption continued so long that the officials moved the play to the other end of the field, where Burrough eventually kicked the decisive three-pointer.

"I just reached over him (Bolton) and caught the ball," Burrough said of the key pass play. "I caught the ball, Bolton held on and I didn't let go until the official told me I had it."

Bolton told a different story. "I had possession of the ball, there's no question in my mind. It was just a call."

Houston Coach Bum Phillips explained the officials ruled both players had possession of the ball on the catch, in which case the ball goes to the offensive player, under National Football League rules.

"We played two good football games in two weeks and controversy has been beating us," Phillips charged Cleveland safety Thom Brennamer. He was referring to the Oilers' overtime loss last week to

## Browns fans to be checked

CLEVELAND — Cleveland Browns owner Art Modell announced Sunday fans attending future Browns home games will not be permitted to enter the stadium with containers, bottles or cans.

Modell said containers, bottles or cans will be confiscated at the entrance gates before fans are admitted.

Modell's action stemmed from a bottle and can throwing melee that began in the east end zone grandstand of Municipal Stadium Sunday, following a disputed call by officials in the late stages of the Houston-Cleveland game.

Several players, mostly on the Oilers team, were hit by things thrown from the stands by fans. The melee last so long that officials were forced to move the play to the other end of the field.

drives in the third and fourth quarters. Pastorini tossed a 42-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Rich Caster and running back Rob Carpenter ran seven yards for a score to fuel the Oiler's second half rally.

But Cleveland kicker Don Cockroft tied the score on a 40-yard field goal with 6:14 left in the game. The three-pointer was set up by linebacker Charlie Hall's recovery of a Houston fumble on the Oilers' 24-yard line.

The Browns led 10-0 at halftime on the basis of a Cockroft field goal and a seven-yard touchdown pass from Brian Sipe to Dave Logan. The only touchdown by either club in the first half came with just four seconds left in the second quarter on the Sipe-to-Logan toss.

The third quarter was a different story, as Pastorini took his club on a five-play, 65-yard drive, capped by his touchdown pass to Caster in the third quarter. The extra point attempt was blocked and the score stood at 10-6 in favor of Cleveland.

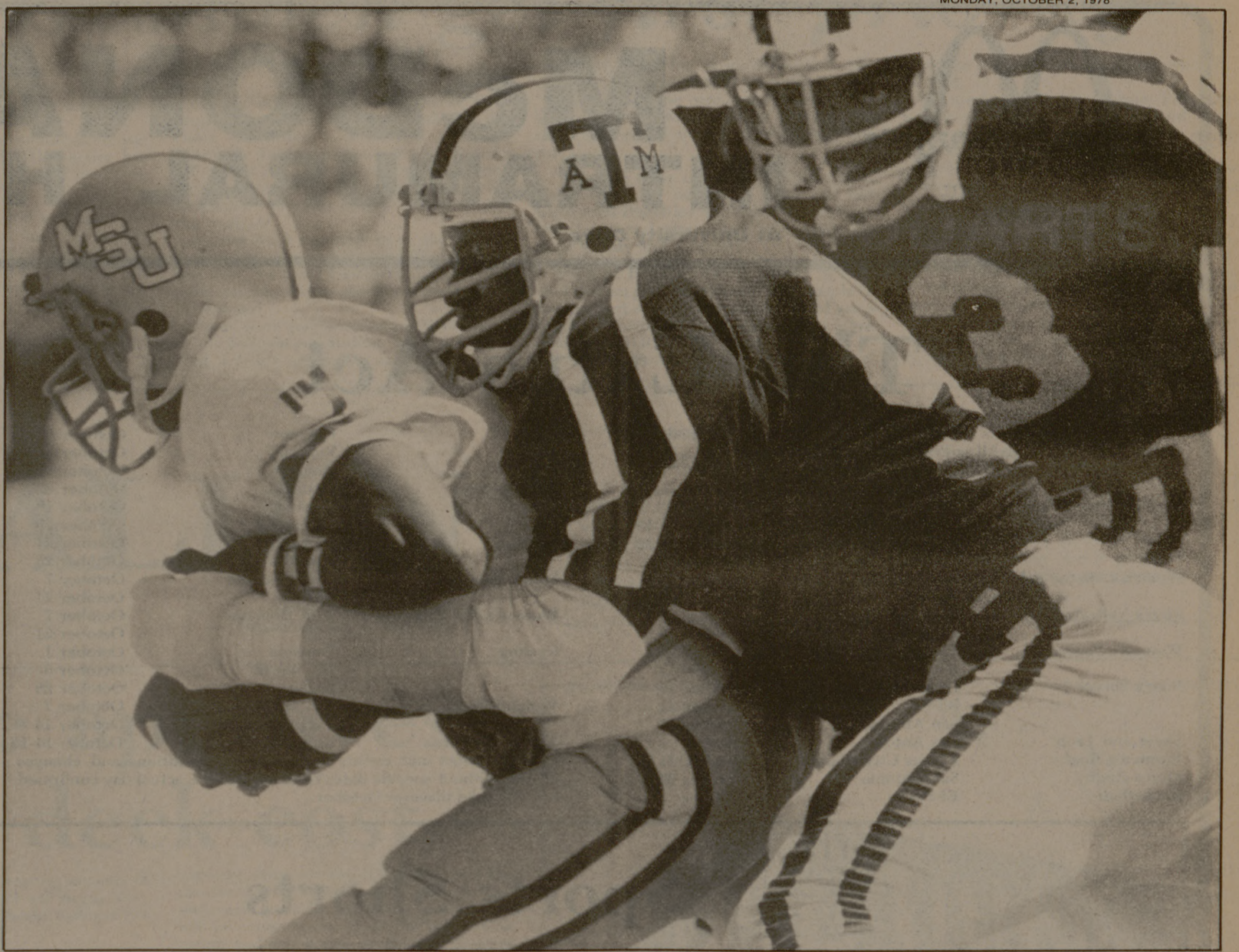
The Oilers, however, stymied the Browns' offense during the third quarter, and late in that period Houston began to move again.

This time Pastorini mixed passing and running plays effectively to take his club to Cleveland's seven-yard line. From there, Carpenter ran it in to give the Oilers the lead.

The Browns opened the scoring on a 43-yard drive that setup a 41-yard field goal by Cockroft. That series was marked by some sharp passing by Sipe.

The Browns' other score in the first half was setup by cornerback Clarence Scott, who intercepted a Pastorini pass and returned it to the Oilers' 42.

Sipe took over with 1:23 left in the half and directed his club on a seven-play, 42-yard touchdown drive. He capped the series with a touchdown toss to Logan with only four seconds left before intermission.

# Hall of Fame selections made

Four former Texas A&M sports stars have been selected to be enshrined in the Texas A&M Athletic Hall of Fame.

During a meeting of the Hall of Fame Selection Committee held Saturday, John DeWitt, Dave Elmendorf, Marty Karow and Pat Olsen were chosen out of ten nominees for the honor. They will be officially enshrined in a ceremony before the A&M-Rice football game on October 28.

Nominees are selected by nomination from the general membership of the Texas A&M Lettermen's Association. The Selection Committee decides the ten finalists, whereupon the 48-member Selection Committee selects the four inductees after discussion about the merits of each finalist.

To be eligible for the award, a letterman must have graduated from the University at least five years prior to induction. The final four honorees, at least one must be an Old Timer, an alumnus who attended the University from 1936. In addition, only one may be selected each year.

John DeWitt was an outstanding

three-sport letterman in track, baseball and basketball during the late forties and early fifties. He set a personal scoring record of 58 points during the finals of the Oklahoma City Basketball Tournament.

Dave Elmendorf was the first Aggie ever to win All-America honors in more than one sport when he made the All-America football team in 1969 and the All-America baseball team in 1970. He was a member of the 1969 all-SWC football team and a three-year member of the all-SWC baseball team. He also won several awards in academics and is currently a safety with the Los Angeles Rams.

Marty Karow was a back field coach for the Aggies from 1939-41, during which time Texas A&M won the 1939 national football championship. He served as A&M baseball coach from 1938-42 and again from 1948-50. He also coached basketball from 1942-46.

Pat Olsen was a pitcher on the Aggie baseball team during the early twenties who was only the second pitcher in Texas A&M history to defeat Texas twice in one year. In addition, he also played baseball with the New York Yankees. A&M's new baseball field was recently named in his honor.
