GAO reports metric liquor may cost more

United Press International WASHINGTON — If you've ared with your liquor dealer that iter bottles of booze seem to cost more per ounce — or centiliter — than the old quart or gallon jugs, you now have a government agency your side

A General Acounting Office study Wednesday showed wine and beer ottled in new metric containers can ost consumers up to 10.5 percent nore than the old bottles.

The GAO found the switchover, approved by the Bureau of Alcohol, obacco and Firearms, resulted in a largely detrimental" impact on onsumer prices, and said the gency should inform buyers of the

The switch to metric bottling will e completed for wines at the benning of 1979 and for liquors a

The GAO found wines increased n price by 2.9 percent when changed from a four-fifths quart botle to a 750-milliliter container.

The increase was even more — 0.5 percent — for the conversion of e-half gallon to 1.5-liter bottles of ne. And the gallon to three-liter hange cost consumers a 6.7 percent rice hike.


