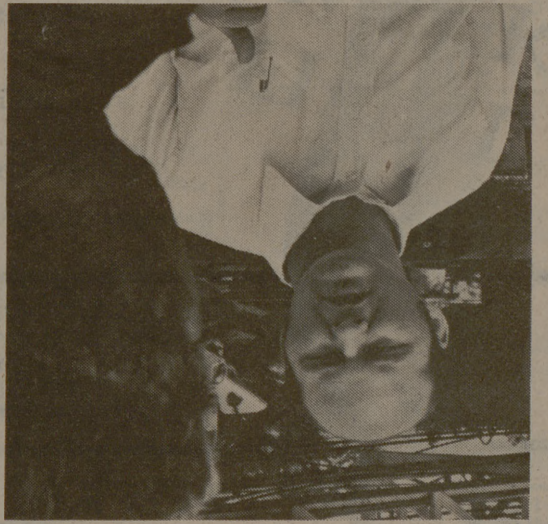

Living with the law

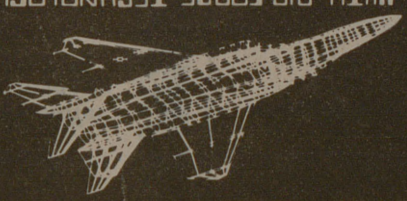

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Guests risk \$1,500 for 114-year-old sip

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — After one sip, a roar went up from the crowd of 600 members. The guests, who paid \$1,500 each for a glass of the world's most expensive wine, said it was the best they'd ever tasted. The extraordinary wine tasting, accompanied by a nine-course gourmet dinner, was arranged Saturday night by John Crisman, proprietor of an Italian restaurant and owner of the \$18,000 bottle of Chateau Lafite. Proceeds from the dinner, attended by 30 guests, will go to help St. Jude Children's Hospital in Memphis. Crisman set a world record with his purchase of the 1864 jeroboam red Bordeaux at a wine auction in Atlanta five months ago. Michael Felix, a French-born chef, spent three days preparing the gourmet dinner. J. Michael Broadbent, director of Christie's, London-based wine department, and the auctioneer at Heublein's annual rare wine sale were brought in to advise guests "what to expect from this giant" bottle of the 1864 vintage. The Heublein spokesman said the jeroboam was the only remaining bottle of the 1864 vintage. Crisman said when he purchased the jeroboam it "was the moment of my life." He said he previously had never spent more than \$55 for a bottle of wine.
