United Press International WASHINGTON — President Carter, reflecting administration concern over the pace of Soviet ivil defense improvements, has approved a new plan to ensure the nation's preparedness in the event of a major nuclear attack, it was reported Monday.

The New York Times said the five-year program would cost about \$2 billion — up from roughly \$90 million spent last year on civil defense. The program will require congressional approval. The program is not geared to a massive — and costly — building


