Scholarship is '79 class gift

The senior class at Texas A&M University is planning to leave the school a different type of gift than most senior classes. The Class of '79 is going to fund a President's Endowed Scholarship.
Donald Rohel, class adviser, said the class has already raised about \$11,000. Christmas card sales and a welcome-back dance are just two of the activities they have sponsored since their sophomore year. On Dec. 9 the class will sponsor a Christmas formal to raise more money for the fund.
An additional source of money will come from dorm room deposits, said Buck Weir, executive director of the Association of Former Students. Seniors were sent letters requesting they contribute their dorm room deposits or their property deposit.
The amount needed for a scholarship is \$25,000, said R.M. Logan, head of the Student Financial Aid Office. When this amount has been collected, the money will be given to the University and invested in a certificate. From the 6 percent interest generated, a perpetual scholarship is established. The interest gained from the initial gift is enough to sustain the next recipient.
Every five years an incoming freshman will be designated as a Class of '79 scholar. The student will receive \$1,500 every year for four years.
Recipients of the scholarships are nominated by their high school principal during their junior year. These nominations are sent to Texas A&M and the scholarship committee of the University selects the recipients. There are usually about 40 scholarships and awards available each year.

Energy credibility of administration hit

WASHINGTON — During the long coal strike last winter, the administration asked a computer how many people might be thrown out of work due to the walkout.
The computer said the "best case" estimate was 27,000 and the "worst case" was 3.5 million. But all the public was told — as well as the judges who were asked to issue injunctions against the strike — was the higher figure.
The actual job loss was 25,500.
That apparent public relations gambit, said a congressional investigator, widened an existing "credibility gap" that might have dangerous consequences in the emergency.
J. Dexter Peach, director of the General Accounting Office's energy division, told a House energy and power subcommittee Friday that the administration did not act as honestly as it could have, given the wide range of information available to it.
"We believe that as a minimum the administration should have formed the public as to the unemployment. In contrast, however, it appears that the credibility gap regarding energy information has been widened."
