FOR STUDENTS COMPLETING 92 HOURS AT THE END OF THE FALL '78 SEMESTER TO BE ELIGIBLE TO ORDER THE TEXAS A&M SENIOR CLASS RING, AN UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT MUST HAVE AT LEAST NINETY-TWO (92) SEMESTER HOURS, WITH 30 HOURS AT A&M AND BE IN GOOD STANDING. TO ORDER AT MID-SEMESTER USING MID-SEMESTER GRADES TO FULFILL THE ABOVE REQUIREMENTS, PLEASE NOTE THE FOLLOWING INSTRUCTIONS:

1. LEAVE YOUR NAME, MAJOR AND I. D. NUMBER WITH THE RING CLERK, HEATON BUILDING, PRIOR TO NOVEMBER 1ST IF POSSIBLE, OR AT LEAST ONE WEEK IN ADVANCE OF ORDERING. THIS MAY NOT BE DONE BY PHONE.
2. BRING MID-SEMESTER GRADE REPORTS ALONG WHEN READY TO ORDER TO VERIFY PASSING HOURS.
3. ANYONE HAVING FAILED TO LEAVE THEIR NAME IN ADVANCE AND FAIL TO BRING THEIR MID-SEMESTER GRADE REPORT ALONG WHEN READY TO ORDER WILL BE ASKED TO RETURN LATER TO ALLOW TIME FOR RECORDS TO BE CHECKED.
4. ALL RINGS MUST BE PAID FOR IN FULL WHEN THE ORDER IS PLACED. SENIOR RING ORDERS ARE AVAILABLE THROUGH STUDENT FINANCIAL AID IN THE YMCA BUILDING.
5. MID-SEMESTER ORDERS WILL BE TAKEN ONLY FROM OCTOBER 30TH UNTIL DECEMBER 1ST, 1978.
6. STUDENTS WHO DO NOT PLACE THEIR ORDER DURING THIS PERIOD MAY ORDER AFTER FINAL GRADES ARE POSTED. THERE WILL ONLY BE A 2-3 WEEK DIFFERENCE IN DELIVERY TIME FOR THOSE STUDENTS ORDERING IN JANUARY. (WHENEVER 92 HOURS HAVE BEEN COMPLETED AND ARE ON RECORD, THERE IS NEVER A DEAD-LINE, EXCEPT A MONTHLY MAILING DATE ON WHICH WE SEND ORDERS TO THE FACTORY).

8. ALL RINGS ORDERED, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER ON OCTOBER 30TH OR DECEMBER 1ST, WILL BE DELIVERED ON THE SAME DAY WHICH WILL BE APPROXIMATELY FEBRUARY 28, 1978.

Shot on way to trial

Father kills prisoner

SAN ANTONIO — A 57-year-old man, seeking revenge and operating as if he "just had a job to do," quietly confronted a chained prisoner on his way to the courtroom to be tried for killing the man's sons.

Juan Rodriguez then pulled out a pistol and fired all six shots at Jimmy Garza, 31 — one of 15 chained prisoners — walked from a paddy wagon to a side door of the Bexar County Courthouse Monday.

The shooting finished, Rodriguez, father of two men Garza was

accused of killing, dropped his pistol on the courthouse sidewalk and surrendered. Later in the day he was charged with murder.

"He didn't try to escape or nothing. He just had a job to do and he had done it," said a deputy. "Then he just put the gun down and gave up."

No other injuries were reported.

Garza was being taken to the courthouse to be tried in the shooting deaths of Rodriguez' sons, Alfredo, 32, and Eleodoro, 38, at a bar on Aug. 13, 1977.

Attorney Julie Marquez represented Garza, said he stayed in jail rather than post bond because he had threatened.

Marquez said Garza pleaded self defense in the killing of the Rodriguez brothers, claiming they were attacking him with pool cues.

Sheriff Rudy Garza said he doubted that an additional measure could have prevented a prisoner from being shot.

However, Garza said he knew of the threats on the day he would have taken additional precautions such as transporting victim separately from others.

Powell hearing delayed

HUNTSVILLE — A judge decided whether police officer Lee Powell should be held at Rusk State Hospital, where he ended a lengthy hunger strike or be returned to death row. He started it, was taken Monday because Powell could not attend the hearing.

State District Judge John Warren scheduled the hearing Monday but Powell's lawyer not attend. His attorney previously indicated they seek the delay to bring a psychiatrist, Dr. Emanuel in Detroit.

Powell remained at Rusk. He was sent Nov. 11 after a developed a bleeding esophagus to forced tube feedings administered by attendants at the Department of Corrections, Huntsville.

Monday's hearing was prompted by a motion filed by state attorney Powell back to Huntsville.

Warren ordered Powell referred to Rusk, a division of Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, testimony by a prison psychiatrist he was determined to die under circumstances he controls.

A prison doctor testified refusal to eat and resultant feedings had seriously injured Powell, 27, convicted of the slaying of Austin patrolman Ablanded, refused to eat for in October and was for one month before his transfer to "hype."

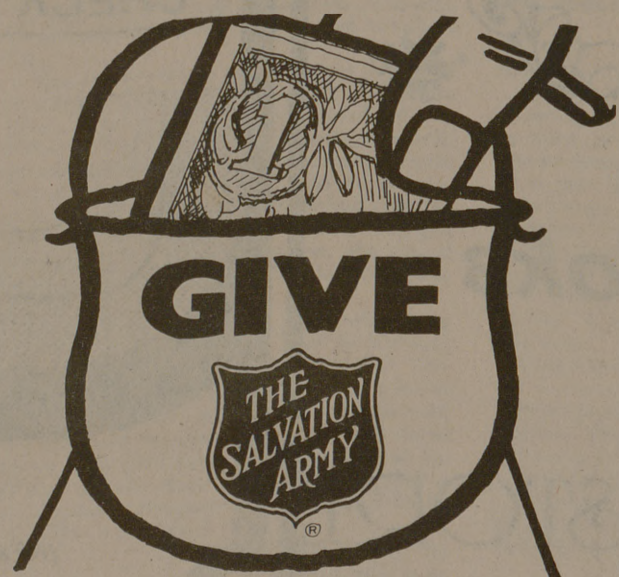
