### Cancer Society sells possible carcinogen

WASHINGTON — Red lollipops colored with potentially cancer causing dye are being sold by some American Cancer Society chapters to raise money to fight the disease.

The Center for Science in the Public Interest, which disclosed the situation Tuesday, told the society it should stop the practice until the safety of the dye - Red No. 40 - is determined The society disagrees

A spokesman said suckers of various colors have been sold in some areas "by highly motivated people, people dedicated to conquering cancer. Some of them may have had Red 40, some of them may not." 'Until Red 40 is declared by the FDA to be a danger to public health, its continued use in manufactured products is perfectly proper," the spokesman added.

Red 40 is the second most widely used food coloring in the United States. It is sanctioned for use by the Food and Drug Administration and is entering the food supply at the rate of about 1 million pounds a year in such things as soda pop, frosting mix, ice cream and candy.

"It is highly irresponsible for the Cancer Society to use a promotional gimmick that contains a dye that is suspected of being carcinogenic," CSPI said in a letter to society executive vice president

The ACS should immediately discontinue the distribution of the lollipops and join with others who are urging the Food and Drug Administration to place a total ban on the use of Red No. 40 until its safety is established beyond a doubt," it said.


