SWC shootout tonight

Ags defeat Tech, visit Longhorns

David Britton is the "Hollywood" Henderson of the Texas A&M basketball team.
The junior college transfer from New York dances on court during

pre-game warmups. He whistles during player introductions. He taunts opponent players. He freely flashes the "No. 1" hand signal to the crowd several times during the course of games (which has been known to bring a different single-

fingered response from opposing fans).
And on occasion Britton, like Henderson, will talk to anyone who will listen. He talked Saturday night after the Aggies had defeated Texas Tech 68-63.

"I was rooting for Texas (which defeated USC in Austin's Special Events Center) today," Britton said. "Kentucky went three years without losing at home. Houston had never lost three in a row. Arkansas had never lost three in a row. I wanted the Longhorns to be 22-0 (in the Superdome). That way I can say that I was part of history again."

Texas A&M coach Shelby Metcalf agreed that defeating Texas in the Superdome tonight would be reason to revise the history books.
"This team has made a lot of history," Metcalf said Saturday night. "I just hope they can write one more chapter."
The chapter that the Aggies wrote Saturday evening will tell about how Texas A&M, down 35-30 at halftime, came back and defeated the Red Raiders in front of 7,763 people in G. Rollie White Coliseum and 600 people watching on closed circuit television in Rudder Auditorium.
"In the first half, I just wasn't doing anything the way I was supposed to," said Aggie freshman Rudy Woods, who allowed Tech's Joe Baxter to hit six of six field goals in the initial period. "I seemed to have been in a trance. In the second half, I snuck out of it and started doing like I should have." Woods was the game's leading scorer with 21 points.
Britton found another reason for Texas A&M's second half resurgence.

"Our crowd is intimidated," observed. "Players all agree conference will say that the doesn't bother them. But it bothers them. This place is I love it."

Obviously, the Longhorns strong affections for their court, as well. Did Metcalf Texas on television Saturday noon?
"No, I don't like horror the Aggie coach quipped, as though he was preparing one-on-one of one-liners with coach Abe Lemons.

"I'm not sure what it takes Texas," Metcalf said more. "We can't play swap-out with you shoot and we'll have to have to play a fine defense and hold them to one shot."

Texas, which starts Jim Tyrone Branyon, John Baxter and Phillip Stroud, as A&M have identical 41 records going into tonight, which tips off at 7:30.

"They're the No. 1 team conference, along with us," said. "But no team in the Southwest Conference is going to intimidate. Their rebounders can't go with our front line. And they can't go with our guards. So we have a better team than their title."
