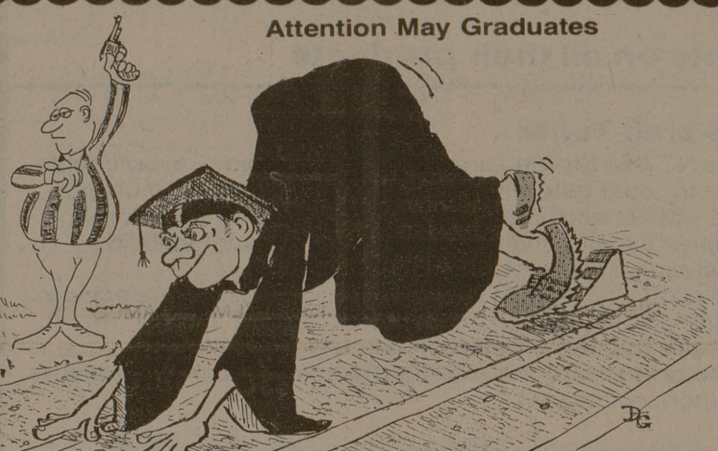

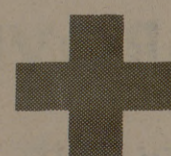

Baker corrals GOP

United Press International EASTON, Md. — Rep. Sen. Howard Baker has assumed his expected role as Washington GOP establishment favorite candidate for president.

At the Republican leadership conference over the weekend, Baker's name was mentioned as a possible presidential pick. And he did it at a forum several possible presidential picks — Sen. Robert Dole of Kansas, Gov. James Thompson of Illinois and Reps. Jack Kemp of New York and John B. Anderson of Illinois — also were mentioned. However, the Republican Tennessee is in trouble with members of his party, especially right wing, because of his ratification last year of the Panama Canal treaties.

Analysis

Without Baker's determined rallying of Republican senators, Carter would have failed. Now Baker has picked a treaty — the Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty with the Soviet Union to break with the administration. The leadership conference overwhelmingly to back the SALT resolution saying there will be no GOP votes for the treaty. Carter gets tough with the administration on everything from rights to Soviet troops in Africa. There were only three dissenting votes among the 100 GOP House members.

Baker's surprising strength in the conference was evidence he still runs for president from the floor of the Senate, and you really have to tread through the New Hampshire — as Carter did a year before the first primary. The campaign of Howard Baker is not as dormant as many believe. Seven freshman Republican senators gathered for dinner last week. In an informal discussion all agreed Ronald Reagan was clear front runner for the nomination as things stand now. But all seven, representing the spectrum of the GOP, also wished it would be someone like Reagan — and Baker was the one they mentioned most.

Whippings cause parental anger, action

United Press International BEGGS, Okla. — Angry parents are demanding a grand jury investigation of the Beggs school for its spanking of students, including some with learning disabilities as a form of motivation.

Superintendent Jim Hester attributed the problem to the 880-student school which has been experiencing "There are new people who moved into our community they're not used to the type of discipline that we have here. Parents of 26 of the school's sixth-grade students, including some special education children, demanded the investigation. They complained their children were beaten with wooden paddles and whips to achieve expected academic standards.

David Bussett, president of Beggs Parent-Teacher Organization, said some pupils were after they entered Beggs School, which includes grades through eight.

Bussett said, "They were punished for things like low grades, getting their homework and spelling words," he said.

Two children with learning disabilities who were placed in special classes were beaten for three days for not keeping up, he said.

The children, who were whipped for discipline, required medical attention, Bussett said.

Following a closed meeting of the school board Friday, Bussett said parents were told an attorney would be allowed to draw up a petition regarding the handling of students at the school board's review.

The parents group views the only "temporary relief from whippings," Bussett said. A petition seeking a grand jury investigation of the school system currently has about 100 names, he said.

Bussett said the group has secured testimony from two students showing that students were whipped by the beatings.
