Work has begun in the old Airmen's Service Center at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center on Highway 21 to convert it into a cafeteria, a University official said

Lloyd Smith, associate director of food services, said, "It's really just a change in location. There's some construction involved to adapt the

building to put a kitchen in."

Smith said there has been a food service facility at the Research and

Extension Center for about 10 years, but now there is a need for better facilities.

"It's being built as a convenience because of the expanding programs out there," he said. "There wasn't a real need for cafeteria space until now. It's a much better facility than what we currently have. Also, most people out there don't have any other place to go to eat. The closest place to go is downtown Bryan, which is five miles away. It's a 15- or 20- minute drive to get to the main campus, so there's a real need.

Smith believes the move will be helpful due to crowded conditions in the current food service facility.
