Boyd says this is the case with the Brazos jail. He says the Texas Commission on Jail Standards has only been in existence a couple of years. He said they brought in a lot of new rules when they began operation. He said the county is trying to comply with the new standards, but it needs more money, men and public support.

Holmgreen refused to estimate the cost of a new jail or the cost to fix the existing jail. Both Holmgreen and Boyd did agree it would run into the millions of dollars.

Holmgreen said he wanted the county to be able to correct the problem on its own. He said that Dallas County had recently had the same

Rather than face this possibility, Holmgreen says the panel he is appointing will study the matter so that the county can handle the problem itself

In the report presented to the county commissioners, the grand jury praised the sheriff's department for the work done with limited manpower, but stressed the need for additional money for equipment and personnel.


