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
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
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

Hall soaring higher

Randy Hall's future is up in the air. As a matter of fact, so are his past and his present. Hall is a pole vaulter for the Texas Aggies, the defending Southwest Conference track cham-

In 1978, Hall used his pole vaulting skills to aid the Texas A&M track team in its victory of the Southwest Conference championship. This year, the sophomore from Port Lavaca hopes that his performance can once again lead to an Aggie victory at the SWC meet. And Hall

"Everybody out here dreams of going to the Olympics," Hall said as rain clouds threatened his Tuesday afternoon practice session. "It is the

ultimate thing to do."

Hall, who last week set a personal record and a meet record at the Drake Relays with a vault of 17-5½, figures that it will take a vault of at least 18-6 to even qualify for the U.S. Olympic team. But, according to Hall, his first 18-foot vault is "right around the corner.

"I don't think 18 is very far away," he said. "Even in high school I think I was capable of 18. It's just a matter of technique and psych jobs and everything else. My biggest barrier was getting over the 17-foot mark."

Hall cleared 16-10 while vaulting for Calhoun High in Port Lavaca, but he did not pass the 17-foot mark until last summer. Ironically, that vault, made in Bloomington, Ill., qualified him to compete with the AAU junior team — in Russia.
"I can't believe they're having the

Olympics in Moscow; it's so terrible," Hall said. "They are technically so far in the past. Their airports are bad. Their hotels are bad." Hall said that he feels the Russian

government, which pays its athletes to train for the Olympics, will do almost anything to gain an advantage in competition. They intentionally kept us away

from the (Olympic) stadium so we wouldn't know what it's like," he said. "And I'm sure all their athletes work out on the (stadium) track. "Their athletes train year-round,

eight hours a day, just like a man over here who has a job. That's another advantage for them. The American athlete can't train because it costs so much money

This summer, Hall will participate in the AAU senior meet, another stepping stone towards the Olym-

"If I can finish in the top six (in the AAU senior meet), I'll be ready for the trials in '80," Hall said. "The

But the Olympics are in the future. Hall's present concern is the SWC meet which takes place in Austin May 11-12.
