Reagan trailed Carter 47-45 percent in a similar sampling of voters in May but in June led by a 51-43 percent margin, Monday's poll showed. Baker, like Reagan an unannounced candidate for the GOP

carrier still led Connally 52-41, but the gap had narrowed sharply since the 62-32 percent lead he enjoyed in March.

The survey said a majority of Democrats and independents — 58 percent — believe Kennedy would defeat Carter for the nomination.

The poll was a sampling of 1,218 voters across the country.

WASHINGTON — Consumer

prices shot up another 1.1 percent in May, the Labor Department re-ported Tuesday. Gasoline and fuel oil continued their rapid rise, but

food costs grew more slowly.

It was the fifth straight month that the seasonally adjusted Consumer Price Index has risen in the 1 per-cent range and showed inflation is continuing strong even while many believe the economy is entering a slowdown or recession.

Retail prices have risen 10.8 percent during the past 12 months and at an annual 13.6 percent rate in the past three months.




