Official asked to apologize

CORPUS CHRISTI — The nanited Latin American Citizens uesday called on Texas Education ommissioner Alton O. Bowen to apologize for remarks he made Monday about bilingual education. Attorney Ruben Bonilla said Bowen ought to resign if he does not pologize to Hispanic students for saying language and cultural maintenance should be a function of the home, family and community and not the schools.

"I can understand if it (bilingual acation) comes under attack from parents and novice community eaders," Bonilla said, "but for it to me under attack and criticism rom the State Education Commissioner of Texas is a disgrace to the concept of of equal educational opportunity in the State of Texas."

Bowen told 4,000 Texas school dministrators at their San Antonio convention Monday that the state's bilingual education programs were 'hastily'' conceived and may not be working as well as professional educators contend.

The commissioner received only scattered applause during the speech in which he also said educaion is "too important to be left to professional educators" and that administrators should "start listenng to the people of the state to hear what they want fortheir children.

Bowen said: "The jury is still out in bilingual education, and until we understand clearly what it does and oes not do, we should not expand ilingual education until we know

"I think it would be appropriate for us in the Hispanic community to demand that the commissioner, 1. apologize to the Hispanic children of Texas, or, 2. that he resign his position if he is unable to cope with the educational needs of the fastest growing minority group in the state," Bonilla said. "The Spanish-speaking children

re making up an increasingly larger ercentage in our schools in the tate of Texas. In spite of that im-pressive statistic, Spanish-speaking hildren still have the highest dropout rate and the lowest educational tainment of any other ethnic or racial group, largely due to the public schools' and legislature's incapacity deal with our educational needs. Water rules said to be too stringent

HOUSTON — Less stringent water pollution control standards would afford Americans a cost sav-ings to help fight the energy crisis and inflation without impeding ong-term goals for cleaning up the ation's waterways, the president of he Water Pollution Control Federon contends.

Martin Lang, former water and ewer commissioner of New York Monday vironmental Protection Agency's ministration of the 1972 clean ter act has been "simplistic."

"This energy crisis should compel evision of EPA's administration of he clean water act, which has argely been a simplistic fiat for a uniformly high degree of treatment

verywhere," Lang said. Lang said federal officials have egun to recognize that some waste cumulations and some receiving vers, lakes and oceans do not require high-energy, high-cost facilities for pre-disposal cleanup of

astewater. "Restraint has been imposed on EPA to deter the proliferation of energy-intensive, expensive, advanced waste treatment facilities, elected apparently with no regard for the needs of the receiving stream," Lang said.

"I confidently believe a reasoned ove toward cost-effective treatnent austerely tailored to the real needs of the receiving waters will iterally save billions of dollars over ne useful life of these facilities.'

Lang said his organization always oubted the wisdom of Congress' leclaration in 1972 that American waterways could be cleaned up completely by 1985. Lang said a more realistic goal remains the year


