Wright deplors interest rate policy

WASHINGTON — House Democratic leader Jim Wright of Texas said Wednesday the Federal Reserve Board's high interest policies were inviting economic disaster and were one of the principal causes of inflation.

Wright noted that President Harry Truman once had ordered the board to rescind an interest rate increase, and Wright said, "It is time, and past time, for that kind of leadership again."

It was the first strong public statement against the board's policies from a member of the House Democratic leadership.

Wright noted that New York banks had raised their prime interest rate to 15 percent as the result of the board's "misbegotten policy."

"The Federal Reserve seems to think that raising interest rates is an effective way to curb inflation," he said. "That, I submit, is like pouring gasoline on the fire."

Wright said that the rate of inflation had followed the interest rate as it rose upward.

"High interest rates are clearly price inflationary, not deflationary. They have become, quite clearly, one of the principal causes of inflation," he said.

"High interest rates always have cruelly hurt the poor and moderate income Americans," he said.

Court: silence can't be used against man

AUSTIN — A San Antonio man's silence during pre-trial hearings should not have been used against him, the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals ruled Wednesday in overturning the capital murder conviction of Donald Gene Franklin.

Franklin was convicted for the July 26, 1975, murder of Mary Margaret Moran and sentenced to death.

Franklin made three court appearances before the trial but testified only to facts relating to certain defense motions. During the trial the state used Franklin's silence during the pre-trial hearings against him.

The court in overruling the death sentence said because a defendant has an opportunity to testify does not mean he or she is "expected to speak out."

The criminal appeals court also reversed the 99-year sentence assessed against Jerry Michael Sellers of Hunt County for the Demerol intoxication of his wife on Aug. 20, 1974. The woman's body was found in a shallow grave on Oct. 5, 1974.

Before Sellers' arrest on Oct. 9, 1974, Merle Capwell, a Duchane County, Utah, deputy sheriff executed a search warrant on Sellers' trailer house in Utah. After the search Capwell went to a nearby mobile home belonging to Shirley Watson. Capwell sought to take custody of two children, who were with Watson, and some guns.

The criminal appeals court upheld the life sentence conviction of Paul Jackson Luck for Jan. 9, 1976, murder of Elledge.

Trial testimony revealed Elledge went to Luck's home and accused him of having an affair with his wife. The two struggled, and then Luck bed Elledge twice before sending him.

Luck was arrested the next day at his parents' home in Arlington.

Man pleads guilty in theft of grain

WICHITA FALLS — Johnson, who faked his death to evade authorities when his storage business was about to be liquidated, pleaded guilty Wednesday to interstate transportation of stolen grain, in exchange for dismissal of 15 other charges.

U.S. District Judge Eldon set sentencing for Johnson — faces a maximum 10 years in prison and \$10,000 fine on each count for Nov. 20.

Johnson, 44, of Iowa Park, accused of stealing more than a million in grain and originally pleaded innocent to all 17 counts July 20 in Fort Worth, where he returned to Texas after 24 months in prison.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Wallace Jr. Wednesday said he negotiated with Johnson and his attorney, Gene Douglas, last week before they agreed to the "bargain."

"I was satisfied," Wallace said. "We feel like at this point the government a great deal of expense and everything in preparing for a trial."

Had he not changed his plea, Johnson could have faced a 10-year prison sentence and \$170,000 fine for the theft of more than 400,000 bushels of grain from Texas, Colorado and Oklahoma farmers.
