

Priest seeks friend's euthanasia

MINEOLA, N.Y. — A Roman Catholic priest is seeking to have an 83-year-old fellow clergyman removed from a life-sustaining respirator because "his soul has fled his body."

The Rev. Philip K. Eichner, president of the Roman Catholic Chaminade High School, said Brother Joseph Charles Fox experienced "irreversible" brain damage when he suffered "cardio-respiratory arrest" on Oct. 2 while undergoing hernia surgery.

Fox, who has since been in a coma at Nassau Hospital, "will remain in a permanent vegetative state," said court papers filed Tuesday in state Supreme Court.

Eichner said three physicians at the hospital submitted affidavits attesting that Fox is "brain dead."

Fox "is religiously, ethically and morally deceased" and "his soul has fled his body and has been received in the hands of God," the priest said.

"It was, and is, the view of the Chaminade (Marianist) community,

including Brother Joseph Charles Fox, that we are against the concept of trying to extend respiration through the use of extraordinary life support systems when the brain is incapable of any sapient or rational thought," Eichner said.

"If the good Lord decides in his infinite wisdom to allow Brother Fox to continue to respire, even though the extraordinary life sup-

port systems are removed, no one would dare argue," he said.

Fox retired in 1970 and took up residence at Chaminade. He has 10 nephews and nieces and Eichner's attorney, William F. Levine, said all of them support the withdrawal of the respirator.

State Supreme Court Justice Robert Meade set a hearing for Nov. 7.

House votes to keep price controls on gasoline

WASHINGTON — The House, reversing an earlier action, voted Wednesday to continue federal price controls on gasoline and to allocate its use.

The House voted Oct. 12 to remove the price control and allocation powers as it considered legislation to fund the Department of Energy and its related programs.

But that amendment by Rep. James Courter, R-N.J., passed only 191-188 and Democratic leaders have been working to reverse the vote. They also noted the first vote came on a Friday afternoon, when 56 members were absent.

Under current law, the Energy Department may set maximum gasoline price increases and in a time of shortage may decide how much gasoline goes to each state or city.

South Carolina won't accept shipments of nuclear waste

South Carolina, the only state now accepting low-level nuclear waste, will bar any shipments of radioactive materials originally intended for recently closed dumps in Nevada and Washington.

In Nevada, Gov. Robert List said Tuesday he was going ahead with the shutdown of the state's nuclear dump site — one of only three in the nation — despite mounting pleas from hospitals and research centers to keep it open.

List also criticized President Carter, saying he was more interested in politics than in developing a national policy for the disposal of the nuclear garbage.

"Nevada is a gambling state but

I'm not taking a gamble with our citizens," he said in explaining his decision to close the nuclear burial grounds in Beatty because of a safety violation.

South Carolina, Washington and Nevada are the only states in the nation that bury low-level nuclear debris. South Carolina already accepts about 80 percent of the nation's nuclear waste materials.

Nevada's trouble-plagued dump in the desert near Beatty was ordered closed late Monday by List after four radioactive barrels were found buried outside the fenced property.

Washington Gov. Dixy Lee Ray suspended operations several weeks ago at the nuclear burial ground at

Hanford when she found radium materials improperly packaged.

The two closures left only South Carolina's Barnwell site and Chem-Nuclear Inc. for low-level nuclear waste disposal.

But South Carolina Gov. Riley said he, Ray, and List previously agreed they would allow no increase of dumping in the states if closings were required any of the other states.

"South Carolina's low-level nuclear waste disposal site in Barnwell County will not accept any waste that would normally go to the site in Beatty, Nevada," Riley said Tuesday in reiterating the past agreement.

The 12,000-member Society of Nuclear Medicine, headquartered in New York, asked Nevada to allow radioactive materials from hospitals and laboratories to continue to be buried at Beatty until an alternate site could be found.

The closure, said Dr. Leonard Freeman, president of the society, "creates an immediate crisis for nuclear medicine and for thousands of Americans who need its vital services."

List, who is Western chairman of the American Cancer Society, said he knew the value of using radionuclides in treating the disease, but said the group's "wrath" should be turned instead on Washington.

"It is my belief that President Carter should worry a little bit more about the disposal of low-level waste materials in October of 1979 than the New Hampshire primary in February 1980 or the Florida caucus," he said.

There are a reported 9,000 national licenses to use radioactive equipment and to ship it to commercial sites.

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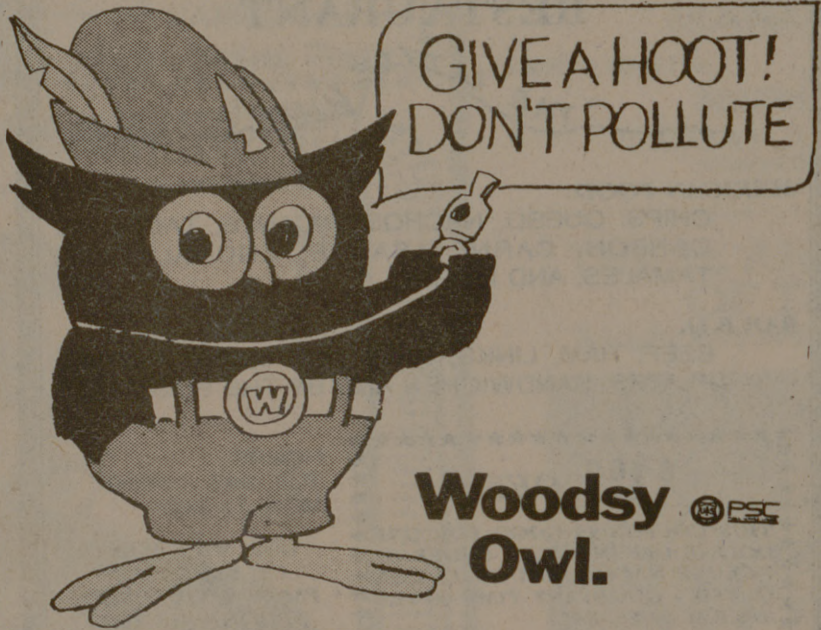

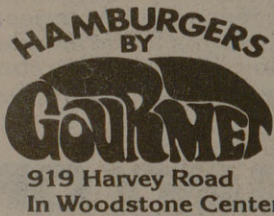
