

Shah invited to Colorado

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — The deposed shah of Iran would find a home in Colorado if he accepts an invitation from a contractor.
 John Campbell, a 33-year-old builder and general contractor, said Wednesday he had written a letter to the shah at Lackland Air Force Base at San Antonio, Texas, inviting him to live with his family.
 The shah is recovering at the air base from cancer therapy and gall-bladder surgery.
 Campbell said he issued the invitation as a show of support for the shah and hoped other Americans

would make similar invitations, though he admitted there was little chance the shah would accept.
 "I do expect a response, but I would think the chances have to be slim he would accept," Campbell said.
 The shah has been made a scapegoat in the current Iranian situation and should not become a "sacrificial pawn," Campbell said.
 "It is time for the American people to take a direct hand in the course of events," Campbell said in his letter. "I believe there are millions who believe that you should not be used as a pawn."

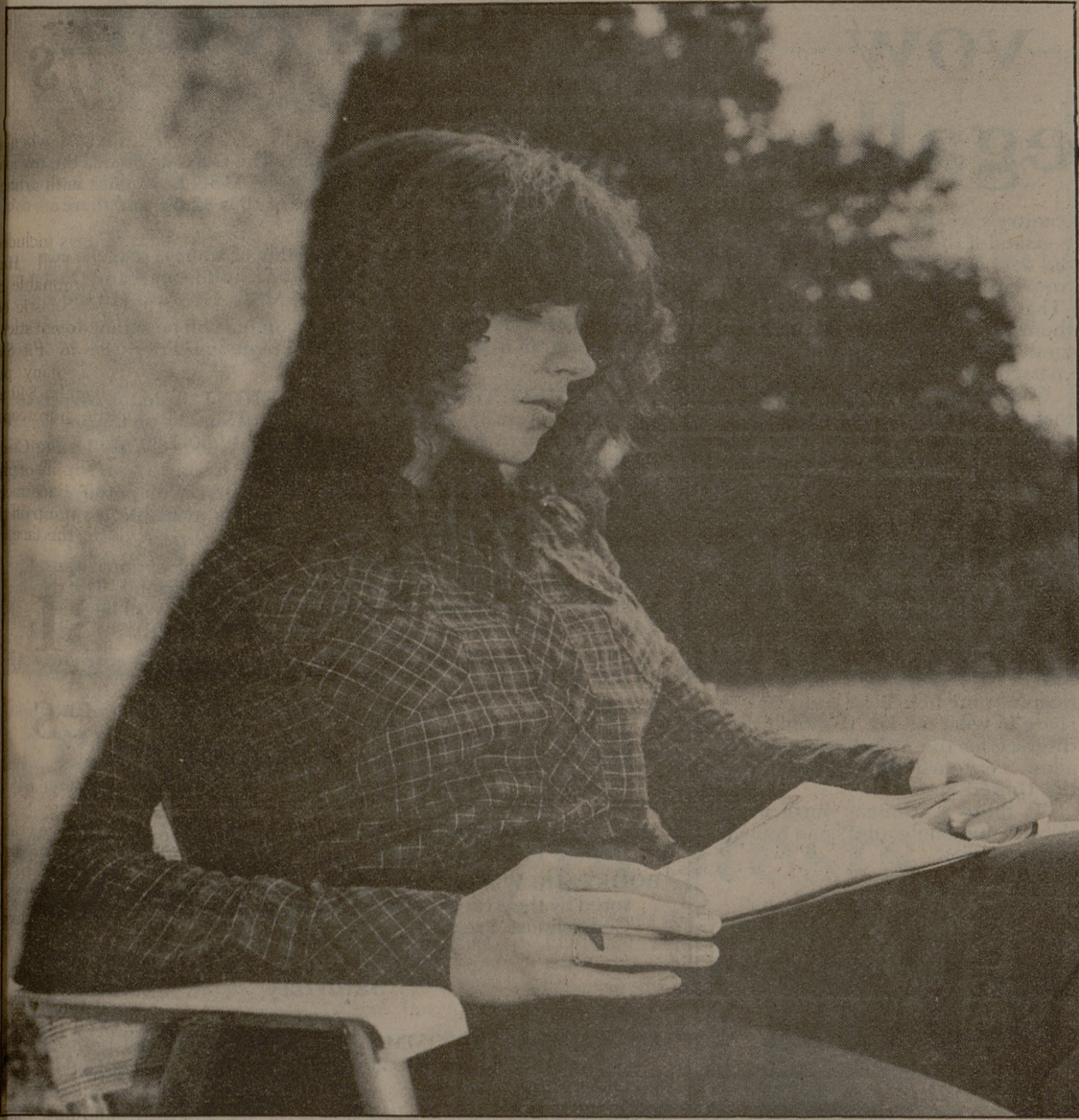
If the shah did accept the invitation, Campbell admitted it might have an adverse effect on the hostage situation in Tehran.
 "It would have some effect on the hostage situation, and probably would not be positive," he said. "But I don't think there are many circumstances that would change anything."

Campbell said he was "very tired of the U.S. apologizing" for its friendship with the shah.
 "He was a friend and ally for 25 years or more," Campbell said. "Good, bad or indifferent, he was our friend. I don't think we need to apologize."
 Campbell said he had the support of his wife, Phyllis, and two children.

Guam may be home for shah

AGANA, Guam — Three legislators have officially invited the deposed shah of Iran to make Guam his permanent place of residence, because of the island's "Christian attitude" toward the politically oppressed.
 The three Republican senators introduced a resolution Wednesday in the Guam Legislature inviting Shah

Mohammed Reza Pahlavi to the American territory.
 "This is no joke," said Tommy Crisistomo who introduced the resolution.
 "We want to show our Christian attitude in Guam," Crisistomo said.
 "We did not object to the more than 100,000 (Vietnamese) refugees in 1975, and we would not object to refugees now."

Governor urges oil deregulation

Clements calls for energy plan

LOS ANGELES — Texas Gov. Bill Clements said Wednesday the turmoil in Iran and resulting threat to the United States is a sign of what will continue to happen unless the nation takes steps to curtail its dependence on imported oil.

Clements, who Tuesday was elected chairman of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission, made the remarks in a speech to that group's annual winter meeting.

Clements said his primary goal as president of the organization will be to work for a comprehensive national energy plan that "embodies the understanding that domestic energy production is the only way this nation will ever be free of our crippling dependence on imported oil."

"This dependence has created a vulnerability for this nation that cannot be tolerated, most importantly because given our natural resources and technological capabilities, it simply is not necessary."

He said domestic oil and gas production will never be a long-term solution to the nation's energy needs, but increased production efforts could lessen the rate of decline in oil and gas supplies until new energy sources are developed.

Clements called for deregulation of the oil and gas and coal industries, and full development of nuclear energy sources. He advocated a 100 percent windfall profits tax of the amount of excess profits not used by oil companies to develop new energy resources.

"Decontrol will increase prices for our consumers, there's no way around it," he said. "While it will bring them nearer the levels paid in other parts of the world, it will also make alternate energy sources more

economically competitive and will provide the capital necessary to establish true energy independence.
 "By keeping prices at below normal levels, we encourage consumption while discouraging development and production. It ought to be exactly the other way around."





