8 Predator talk mi draws boos

AUSTIN — Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus encountered opposition and a scattering of boos Tuesday from a crowd of ranchers, environmentalists and government agency representatives meeting to

discuss predator control programs. The "Predator Control Summit" was organized by Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown in an effort to ease differences between the various groups concerning control of

Andrus was the keynote speaker for the meeting, and told the partici-pants the federal government will use tax funds to control predators only in areas where there have been substantial livestock losses and will

rancher who said he had been put out of the sheep and goat business because of coyotes, cupped his hands to his mouth and booed loudly when Andrus finished his remarks.

During a question and answer period, Richman asked how his area could qualify for federal help in controlling predators under Andrus' guidelines for providing assistance only where substantial livestock kills

He said Bell County had 100,000 sheep and goats 15 years ago, but now has only about 1,000 because of predator problems.

Andrus defended his decision to end research on a controversial com-pound called "10-80," saying the public would never accept the compound for use in predator control and the government could better use its funds to develop a poison that would

"I know the genuine emotions that have been displayed over the predator issue in the past, and they are not going to fade away," Andrus said. "But it's not going to do any of us any good to continue to sharpshoot at one

He said the long range goal of his department is to phase out lethal preventative control measures and **United Press International**




