**Farmers set records with crop production**

WASHINGTON — American farmers harvested a record amount of principal crops in 1979, surpassing a record set in 1978.  
There were records set in corn, soybean, sunflower and hay production. The wheat crop was the second largest on record and the cotton crop the largest since 1965.  
Harvested acreage of principal crops totaled 337 million acres, up 3 percent from 1978.  
Because crops are measured in different quantities, the Agriculture Department measures the total crop by an index, which was 10 percent higher than in 1978.  
The Agriculture Department's Crop Reporting Board said Tuesday the corn crop was 7.76 billion bushels, up 2 percent from the November forecast, for the fifth record crop in a row.  
The size of the latest corn crop was attributed to a small increase in

and a record national average yield of 109.4 bushels per acre, the second year in a row that the national average surpassed 100 bushels per acre. A revised estimate of the 1978 yield was 100.8 bushels per acre.  
In November, the last time the corn crop was estimated, the national average yield was estimated at 109.2 bushels per acre.  
A record soybean crop was estimated at 2.27 billion bushels, 1 percent larger than the November forecast. It was the third record crop in a row.  
The estimate surpassed the 1978 record crop by 21 percent as a result of a record amount of harvested acreage of 70.5 million acres and a record national average yield of 32.2 bushels per acre.  
Both corn and soybeans are used for livestock feed so they are raw materials for beef, pork, poultry, eggs and milk.

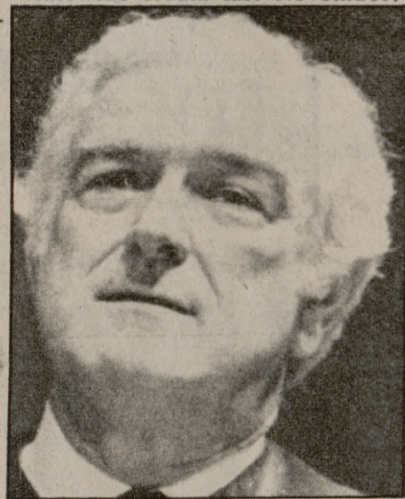
The record sunflower crop totaled 7.3 billion pounds, up 90 percent from 1978.  
All hay production was estimated at 146 million tons, up 3 percent from 1978.  
The final estimate of the wheat crop, 2.14 billion bushels, was released last month. The cotton crop released last week, was 14.9 million bales, up 37 percent from 1978.  
The tobacco crop was estimated at 1.55 billion pounds, the smallest crop since 1943 and 24 percent below 1978.  
The sugarcane crop was up 7 percent to 26.6 million tons while sugar beet crop was down 14 percent to 22 million tons.  
Farmers produced 814 million bushels of grain sorghum, also up for animal feed. The crop was up 8 percent from 1978.  
Rice production was estimated at a record high of 137 million hundredweight, up 3 percent from 1978.

**Campaigners claim Connally coup in Maine GOP caucus**

WATERVILLE, Maine — Aides of rival candidates are fuming over a local Republican caucus, held Monday with little advance notice, which voted overwhelmingly to back former Texas Gov. John Connally for president.

The caucus, believed to be the first in the nation, elected 17 pro-Connally delegates to the state GOP convention. Three others were committed to Ronald Reagan and five were uncommitted.  
In a straw vote at a Republican statewide forum last November,

Connally received only 18 percent of the vote, while George Bush received 34 percent and Howard Baker 33 percent.  
The caucus results drew sharp criticism Tuesday from other campaign organizers, who charged the early caucus was organized by Connally backers with little official notice.  
Attorney Donald H. Marden, Connally supporter who helped organize the meeting, denied those charges was any attempt to rig the caucus.  
"All of the legal requirements were met," Marden said. "It was above board." He said notices were posted with the voter registration board and the local newspaper.  
Only about 50 of the city's more than 2,000 registered GOP voters showed up to vote Monday.  
"The greatest swindle since the Great Train Robbery," snarled state Rep. Porter Leighton, Reagan state political director. "We found out about it Friday night and what we could do over the weekend and are delighted we came in second under the circumstances."  
"I'm very upset Waterville called this caucus without advance notice," said Bush campaign director Norman H. Olsen Jr., who said he found out about it Monday night.  
"It was a cute trick and not at all representative" of Republican sentiment in Maine, added Reagan campaign chairman Howard Dana.  
Asked about Leighton's "train robbery" remark, Marden said, "I really have no idea what he's referring to in that regard. If he means they got caught sleeping at the switch, that may be very true."
