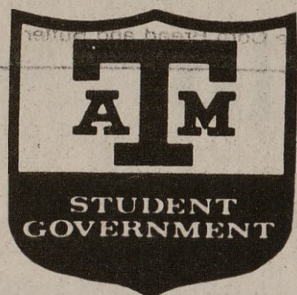

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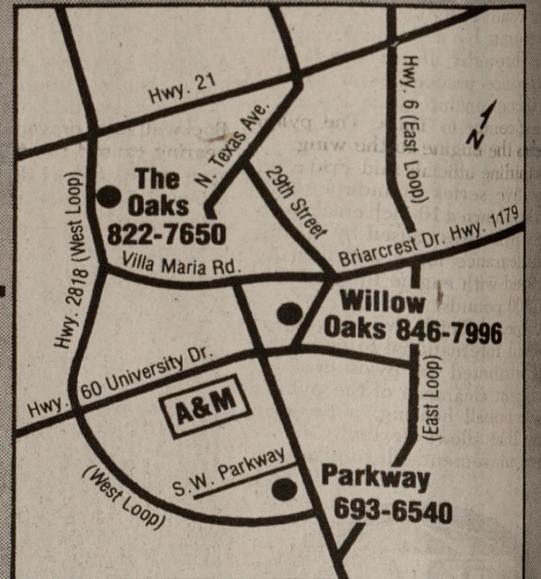
Protester apologizes to Hill

AUSTIN — A Milam County farmer who camped in the Capitol during a week-long protest has apologized to former attorney general John Hill for voting against him in 1978 when Hill opposed Bill Clements for governor.
Hill accepted Charlie Fitts' apology on Friday, a week after the farmer began his hunger strike. He vowed he would neither eat nor leave until Hill arrived.
Hill, who had been in Dallas all week, went directly to the Capitol from the airport with his son and 3-year-old grandson. About 75 Hill supporters cheered the former attorney general as he stepped out of the second floor elevator.
"This is my grandson, John Graham Hill," he said. "He's 3 years

old and he will live to be 107. Let's hope he doesn't live to see another Republican governor."
"Did you bring me a cooked crow?" the farmer asked Hill. "John, Clements made us some promises and he didn't keep those promises. He's not a man of his word. I want to apologize."
"You don't owe me anything," Hill replied. "I'm just sorry you had to torture yourself. I'm just glad you're back in the Democratic Party where you belong. One thing you can always be sure of — the Democrats will take care of all the people."
The husky farmer then sat on the floor with Hill's grandson and munched on turkey and fruit Hill had brought.

Fitts told Hill he had realized the big oil industry was really in control of state government, and had also found out that organized labor can help.
"I found out it's the big oil lobbyists who run this state," he said. "I'll do my best to elect Democrat. I don't think the people of Texas will ever let the big oil companies be another governor's seat."
Fitts, 46, then said he was going home to Rockdale. "But we farmers aren't through yet," he said.
Hill told reporters every Democratic administration had progress in Texas, and said Clements was doing a good job. But he said he would wait until 1981 to decide if he would make another bid for governor. "I don't have any plans at the juncture," he said.

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
