Dr. Dale Webb, Texas AtMa ciate professor of engineering a speak on the use of natural main and construction methods in la

Webb, a civil engineer, will plain various methods of incom-ing the earth in the constructs energy efficient housing.

Webb said we often waste h material and energy resources in signing and constructing ho which insulate us almost comple

from the earth. 'The earth itself maintain almost constant 70 degrees," plained. "Why not build house will take advantage of this? wise, we have to re-create this

perature with air-conditioning, heating. This uses more energy Webb said we can cut ener penses by incorporating a bunderstanding of the earth a little logic" into the way we

Some of the ideas Webb willy sent involve the use of dirt, in near the walls of houses, to both sulate against heat and cold direct the flow of wind. He will discuss building floors below gro level to take advantage of the nati heat of the earth.
