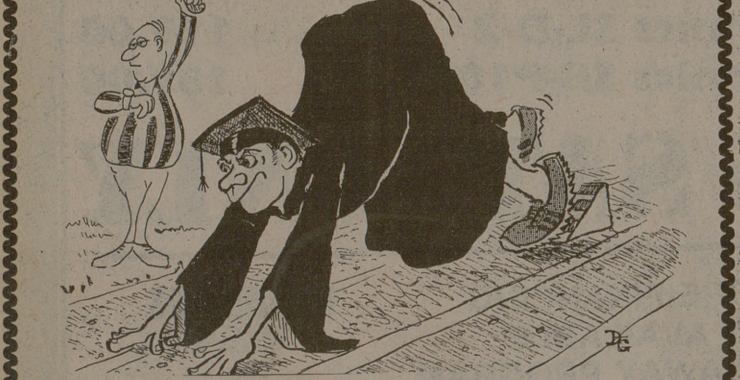

Benedictine monks preserve documents

In school they are still sometimes called "the Dark Ages" — the Medieval or Middle Ages between 476 A.D. and 1450, when education was less esteemed than now. And it fell to the monks of various religious orders to preserve the very foundations of Western culture and civilization.
With painstaking efforts and sometimes exquisite beauty, the Medieval monk-copyists sought to ensure that the important documents, whether sermons from an early bishop or secular letters and treatises were preserved, circulated and handed down from generation to generation.
And now another group of monks, working out of Saint John's Abbey, Collegeville, Minnesota, is practicing that same kind of preservation — this time using high technology.
It was the Benedictines who did most of the copying and preservation during the Middle Ages.
At the abbey, the largest Benedictine Abbey in the United States, the Hill Monastic Microfilm Library has been carrying on the task of microfilming of the very manuscripts so painstakingly copied and preserved by the Medieval monastic orders.
The idea for the microfilming pro-

ject, says the Rev. Julian Plante, director of the project, came from Pope Pius XII, who had already begun the task of microfilming the Vatican manuscript library in 1956.
"Why don't you, in line with your 15th century tradition, go into the hills and valleys, go into the monasteries and small religious communities and do the same thing," Plante quoted the pope as suggesting.
The problem was twofold, according to Plante.
In the first place, many of the manuscripts that has been preserved in the monastic libraries were disintegrating and threatened to crumble to nothing if handled.
And secondly, there was the problem of access. While the monastic libraries contain extensive documents, scholars do not know what kind of material is in what monastery.
But using the technology of a Xerox Corp. subsidiary, University Microfilm, the monks at the Hill Monastic Manuscript Library have begun filming the rare manuscripts and making them more readily available to scholars.
Plante said the monks only film "handwritten manuscripts that generally predate the invention of

printing."
There are exceptions, he said and noted that one more interesting finds the monks has found are letters from the reformer Martin Luther, Bishop of Malta.
After carrying out filming in Austria, Spain, Malta, England and Germany, the monks has amassed the records of 60,000 Medieval manuscripts, pieces, including the copies of works by Aristotle, Aquinas, Horace and Ovid.
Many of the works, such as Luther letters, have been filed away for centuries and are just beginning to rediscover importance.
"It has taken thousands of times to do these things," Plante said. He said the monastic libraries include not only the philosophy but law, science and "extremely important documents for social, economic and political history."
"In the Middle Ages it was monks who were the preservers of the written word and that means have to go the monks not only the sacred history but the history of the period as well."

Scientist fights against bans on some chemicals

Elizabeth M. Whelan didn't blink when she said saccharin isn't bad. In moderate amounts. A couple of cans of diet soda a day, for example.
But when she says such a thing others blink. In disbelief.
Especially regulators in federal agencies — super health sleuths charged with seeing that consumers do not poison themselves with possibly harmful food additives, artificial sweeteners, cigarettes, rotten air, medicines linked to cancer.
High on the list of agencies doing double takes when Dr. Whelan goes to bat for saccharin are insiders at the Food and Drug Administration — which has been trying to bury the artificial sweetener for years.
The latest government report on saccharin, Dr. Whelan said, mistakenly left the impression saccharin, in general, was a cancer-causer in humans.

But on closer inspection, Dr. Whelan and an independent scientific panel found the report showed moderate amounts won't give users bladder cancer.
Some other scientists also drag their feet when it comes to giving saccharin a bad bill of health — used in moderation. Others push for a ban. Saccharin, like everything else Dr. Whelan takes aim at, is controversial.
Dr. Whelan, a research associate at the Harvard University School of Public Health, bills herself as the new breed consumer advocate. Her credentials come from Connecticut College for Women, Yale and Harvard.
The new breed consumer advocate said she represents the new breed consumer — one fed up with the "ban everything" mentality.
Like all consumer advocates, she stirs trouble.
She isn't what Hollywood would call a "type." Dr. Whelan, soft-spoken, sports long blonde hair and a baby face. Thirty-five now, the mother of a toddler, wife of a Wall Street lawyer, daughter of an insurance company executive she does not, on first appearances, fit the image of a two-fisted consumer advocate.

Some critics claim the government front for industry — like, many chemicals or manufacturers would like a ban on saccharin.
Dr. Whelan denies that. She says funds come from grants via government agencies and individual contributions.
"The council does not accept direct contributions from corporations or organizations which have a commercial interest in the issue we are investigating," she said.
The first money — \$100,000 — came from the Sarah Seale Foundation in Pittsburgh.
"That was after we were down by almost 200 foundations, including the Rockefeller and foundations," Dr. Whelan said. "Most told us 'your area of interest is not in our area of interest.'"
There are 64 sources of listed on the form the Council last year with Internal Revenue Service but it cannot be public.
Dr. Whelan said council sponsors are taking a searching second look at government and other reports on cancer causing agents in particular.
"The new breed consumer believes we can have benefits of technology and health," said Dr. Whelan. "Americans are concerned about the relationship of chemicals to the environment and human health."
"And understandably so. For a decade we've seen bannings of proposed chemicals — cyclamates, Dye No. 2, TRIS, aldrin, and recently — saccharin, hair dyes, feine, the pesticide 2,4,5 estrogens, and antibiotics used in animal feeds."
