PITTSBURGH — Officials involved in the current contract negotiations between the steel industry and the United Steelworkers union say they're impressed with the candor that has characterized the talks so far.

The sessions have been closed to the media and both sides have agreed to make only joint announcements, but sources indicate the talks are off to a strong start with more basic issues being discussed in the

early stages of negotiation. Under the schedule, a new contract covering 450,000 USW members at nine major steel companies is to take effect Aug. 1. If an agreement is not reached by April 14, the talks will go to arbitration.

The basis for the "down-to-business" approach could be the result of an industry with outmoded plants battling cheap foreign steel imports from government-backed competitors.

While sources on both sides say productivity and the economic troubles facing the steel industry are leading issues, there are other important areas.

Steel executives said they intend to seek modifications in the industry's "no strike" labor agreement, which they say is too expensive.

Another issue is safety. Joseph Odorich, USW vice president for administration, said 131 union mem-

bers have been killed in the basic steel industry since August 1977, an average of more than four deaths a month. He has called for action to reduce hazards, the USW newspaper Steelabor reported.

The industry bargainer, J. Bruce Johnston of U.S. Steel Corp., said there is enough blame for all to share but 66 percent of the deaths was due to violation of rules caused by unsafe actions rather than conditions.

The industry apparently is prepared to make a productivity issue of contracting out maintenance work. The companies have said the "peaks and valleys" of large-scale repair projects make it uneconomical to keep large maintenance forces.

Johnston stressed cost effectiveness as a key concern as the industry looks at the best ways to achieve profitability.

But USW President Lloyd McBride says contracting out

McBride says the union's priority on the grievance arbitration procedures of the contract.

Those procedures are why the union will fight the industry idea, the removal of steelmaking plants from the steel contract, would mean a grievance rights for affected facilities.

Johnston told the USW that the industry view on non-steelmaking coverage, the union is "away jobs."

Those plants came to the late last year when U.S. Steel plans to shutdown 16 facilities, including non-steelmaking plants.
