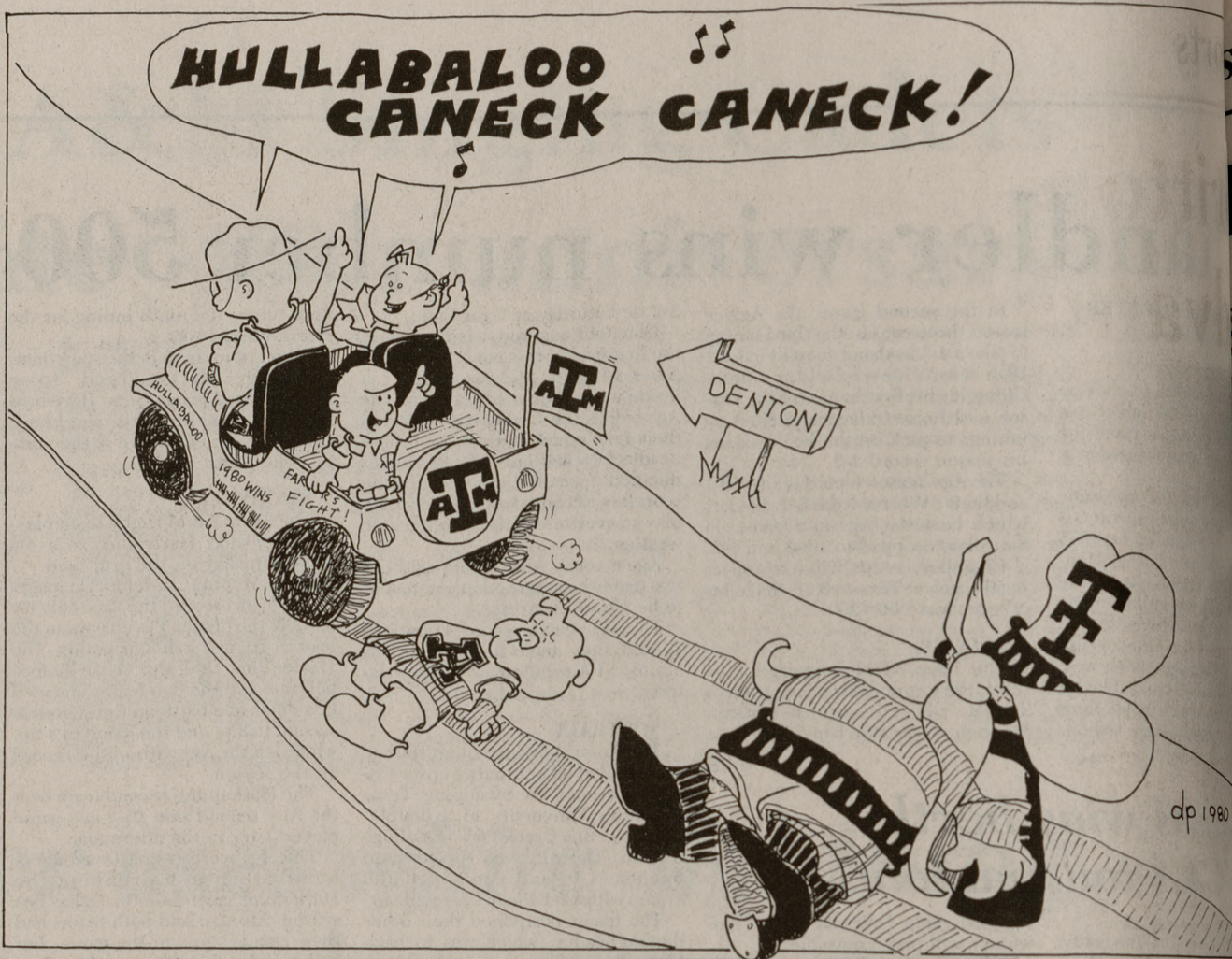

### Scott leads track victo

The Texas A&M University track team beat not only eight opponents, but also miserably defended successfully its unenvied vision title in the Border Open Laredo Saturday.  
The meet, the first major event in the region, was held by near-freezing temperatures increased the chances for the athletes who expected the ly warm Laredo weather.  
Captain Tim Scott braved the cold and led the team, winning the 100 (65-6) and the discus (135-10) and the smaller-than-normal shot put (35-0).  
Some schools — including the college division champion at Christian University — pulled out because they didn't like the weather and the shortened format meet.  
Most of the coaches agree that many of the final event winners were determined best times in the preliminary rounds.  
In spite of his personal best, Scott said the weather — with a wind of 25 miles per hour — helped him and the rest of the team.  
"In the morning, it was real with the chill factor, it was greens," he said, adding that the discus throwers could prefer sweats, the runners had to run usual skimpily uniforms.  
"You can't do anything about that cold — it's like getting up morning," said Scott. The senior who was the only able winner in his division named the meet's outstanding former by the writers covering the event.  
Counting Scott's performance Aggies — who won the South Conference indoor title large field strength — won six out of seven field events in Laredo. Perry placed first in the high (6-8), Reggie Jamerson first in triple jump (46-13), Johnny first in the long jump (23-11) and Randy Hall first in the pole (16-6).  
The only field event Texas lost was the javelin.  
In the running events, the team competing without star sprinter Dickey, who was running the AAU national meet in New York — won the 400-meter relay James Washington, Leslie Steven Willis and Vernon Perry.  
Texas A&M finished with points, ahead of the University of Texas who finished second with points and Baylor, third with points.  
The next major meet for Charlie Thomas and the team is the NCAA indoor championships in two weeks. Thomas and seven Aggies should compete in the meet.
