Councilmen James Dozier compared the subsidizing suggestion to a government paying car maufacturers to install safety belts.

"I don't think the city should sub-sidize smoke detectors," Dozier said. "It simply isn't a function of government.

The new ordinance, if passed, would call for each dwelling unit within a complex to have one alarm

The Parkland Dedication Ordinance, which establishes a tax to be used for city parks, was increased 50 percent from the previous \$150 per dwelling unit.

This will affect apartment complex owners most. In a memo to the council from Al Mayo, director of plan-ning, it was noted that at the rate of 133 dwelling units per acre, the owner would have to pay, at the previous rate, \$19,950. Owners will now have to pay nearly \$30,000.
