Huntsville: The Texas Department of Corrections will hold its Annual Inmate Fine Arts Festival and Sidewalk Art Show, May 3, 1980. The Festival will be held in the Administration Building located on 11th Street and Avenue I, in Huntsville, Texas. Events will be scheduled from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The general public is invited, no admission charge.

Kerrville: Over 200 artists have been chosen to exhibit their artwork for the Texas State Arts & Crafts Fair, May 24-26 in Kerrville. Hours of the fair are Saturday and Sunday, 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.; Monday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Ticket prices are \$2 a day for adults and \$1 for children under 12 years old. A special three-day admission pass providing unlimited access to the fairgrounds during regular fair hours may be purchased for \$7 for adults and \$3.50 for children.
