Tom 'Nobody' wins title, Kent's respect

Tom Judson was one of two freshmen to team up and win the No. 3 doubles championship last weekend at the Southwest Conference tournament.

David Kent, Texas A&M University tennis coach, said Tom "Nobody" became Tom "Somebody" with that win.

Judson, from Fort Worth Arlington Heights High School, and Ron Kowal, a freshman from Naperville, Ill., teamed up to beat Clark Diehl and Jose Lambert of the University of Arkansas in three sets last Sunday to take the title. The 4-6, 7-5, 7-6 match was one of the closest in the tournament.

Judson said he and Kowal were nervous in the first set, and it showed in their performance.

"We knew we had to settle down after the first set," he said, "or the second set would slip away, too."

He said Kent told the pair to relax for the match, "so we tried to laugh and tell jokes on the court in an attempt to stay loose, and it worked."

The tie-breaker in the third set of that match went to 5-4, the closest it could have possibly been. Judson said it was one of the most terrifying experiences of his life.

"We were going against some

name tennis players in the SWC," he said.

He added the pressure was tremendous before the match, but it wore off as the match progressed.

"We thought they were beatable and we had to go out and prove it," he said.

Judson was a walk-on for the Aggies this year. Next year, he will be getting a partial scholarship.

"It's a great feeling," he said. "I came up here with nothing, and now I have something to show for long hours of hard work."

Kent said Judson is one of the toughest competitors he has seen. He could not believe the tenacity of

Judson at the start of the season. "I did everything I could to help Tom," he said, "but he succeeded in spite of me."

Kent said he called Judson "Nobody" in an attempt to motivate him to go to another school.

"I guess I've eaten my words," he said. "I thought he wouldn't be here, but he has."

"He is fearless on the court," Kent said. "He charges into the opponents' best shots and they right back."

Kent added he feels Judson is one of the best forehands he has seen, and has the ability to explode and be a major factor on the court in the future.

"I wanted to try SWC because I wanted to see if I could handle it," he said. "because I knew it was some of the best collegiate tennis players."

He said he had scholarships from many smaller schools, but he chose Texas A&M.

"I heard what kind of a coach and coach Kent was," he said. "I thought I wanted to go to the ground floor with him."

He said he likes the coaches, the fans, and the University atmosphere here.

Judson said he feels he has done well this year, but wants to be a better player next year.

"We can be a good team next year," he said, "and if everything goes right, we could end up in the conference."

The SWC's third team was ranked third in the nation last year. Judson said he will be a lower spot for the Aggs than he was in his high school team. But the four-year, No. 1 player for Arlington Heights said he is happy about the team.

"The lineup will change a bit on who we are playing," he said. "We will play the team in the numbered position."

He said all the Aggies need experience to go all the way in the NCAA tournament.

"It is going to be one of our best years next year. With hard work and a little luck, it'll be a reachable goal," he said.

Women lead for tourney

The Texas A&M University women's tennis team will leave for the State Individual Singles and Doubles tournament today.

The team will travel to Odessa for the tournament which is being held at the University of Texas-Basin.

Kathleen Sissom, Terri Judy Willard and Liliana Perez will compete for the Aggs. Only four are going due to final exams this week. They will play singles through Friday.

Every major team in the state will be represented, said David Texas A&M tennis coach. Teammates include SMU, TCU, Texas State University and the University of Houston.

He said Pan American University, Texas Tech, Lamar and UT-Brownsville are some top individuals who have a chance of reaching the state tournament, to be held in Odessa, La., May 18-19. The California tournament will continue on to the state tournament.

Kent said the ladies have proved progressively with each match this year, and have a chance of qualifying for the regionals.

The state tournament will begin at 9 a.m. Thursday and is scheduled to end at 4 p.m. Saturday with the finals.
