

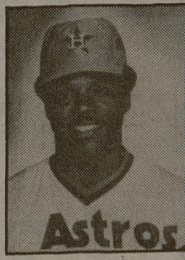
# Astros' batters star in 3-2 victory Lambert, Cobern end successful '80 season

Rafael Landestoy hit a two-run triple with one out in the eighth inning Tuesday night to trigger a three-run rally that gave the Houston Astros a 3-2 victory over the San Diego Padres in San Diego.

Cesar Cedeno opened the eighth with a single off loser Randy Jones, 4-4, stole second and continued to third on catcher Bill Fahey's throwing error to start the comeback.

Bruce Bochy drew a walk and pinch hitter Jeff Leonard bounced into a fielder's choice as Cedeno was nailed at the plate. Dave Bergman, running for Bochy, went to second on the play and scored along with Leonard

as Landestoy drilled a triple to left-center. Craig Reynolds singled to score Landestoy with the third run of the inning. Cedeno has been absent from the

Astros' lineup for nearly a week due to acute bronchitis.

Jerry Mumphy doubled home the Padres' first run in the third and the Padres scored again in the ninth on a pinch hit double by Kurt Bevacqua and a pinch hit single by Tim Flannery.

Vern Ruhle, 2-1, went the first seven innings to get the victory with Frank LaCorte going the final two innings to pick up his fifth save.

The Houston hitting attack, which has been stagnant the past two weeks, erupted for nine hits tonight, and left only four men on base, although the Padres executed three double plays during the contest.

The Astro hitting was led by short-

stop Craig Reynolds, who was two-for-four, and third baseman Enos Cabell, also two-for-four. Bruce Bochy, Houston's reserve catcher, added a one-for-two evening.

Ruhle who has been used sparingly as a spot starter and reliever for Houston this season, allowed only five hits and two bases on balls, before leaving for a pinch hitter in the top of the eighth.

In relief, LaCorte was effective, giving up one run and striking out four batters in route to the save. The victory gave Houston a 26-21 record in 1980, and San Diego dropped to 24-26. The two teams face each other again tonight in San Diego.

# Lambert, Cobern end successful '80 season

Sande Lambert and Vickilee Cobern know the meaning of frustration. So does women's track coach Bill Nix.

Lambert and Cobern finished seventh and thirteenth, respectively, in their events in last week's AIAW national women's track championships in Eugene, Oregon. Only the first six finishers in each event were honored.

Lambert, who earlier in the

year won the pentathlon at the Southern Pacific Association Athletics Congress pentathlon championship in Los Angeles April 13, finished just a slight margin behind the sixth place finisher in that event May 24.

Cobern, who has performed consistently for the Aggie Ladies this season, also failed to qualify in her specialty, the discus.

Nix, however, is happy about the team's performance this season.

"I've been very pleased with

the year as a whole," he said. "The girls have tremendously improved. They set seven new records in the outdoor campaign and several personal records were bested."

Next season, Nix said, they be even better.

"We've recruited four distance runners, a pentathlete and two sprinters," he said. "We start back August 24 to start the season."

"They've (the team) done a tremendous job."

## NCAA championships begin

AUSTIN — UCLA's Mark Anderson took the lead after the first half of the NCAA decathlon competition Tuesday with 4,091 points.

The decathlon is the opening event of this year's NCAA track championships, which will continue at the University of Texas all week.

Anderson, the pre-meet favorite, failed to finish first in any event but still pulled ahead of Arizona State's Jeff Montpas and California-Berkeley's Dave Steen, who were close behind with 3,909 and 3,961 points, respectively.

Anderson took over first place in the high jump, the day's fourth event, when he cleared his personal best of 6 feet 10 1/4 inches, but a sore knee forced him to pass on his remaining attempts. Kansas' Steve Rainbolt won the event with a NCAA meet record jump of 7 feet 3/4 inches.

Montpas was the day's only double winner, taking the 100 and 400 meter runs. In other events, Auburn's Bill Blackburn won the shot put and Steen took the long jump.

The decathlon competition ends today with the high hurdles, discus, pole vault, javelin and 1,500-meter run.

## Houston high school star to receive top track honor

AMARILLO — The 18th Annual Amarillo Chamber of Commerce Texas High School Outstanding track man award will go to Dennis Brantley of Worthing High School in Houston.

Brantley set a meet record in the 110-meter hurdles in the Texas schoolboy track meet in Austin this spring with a time of 13.1. Only one

other high school hurdler in the world has run faster. Renaldo Nehe-miah, now at Maryland and holder of the world hurdle record, ran a 12.9 as a schoolboy in 1977.

Brantley has signed a letter of intent to attend Southern Methodist University on a track scholarship. The award will be given to him later in the year.
