 ABULUS, Israeli-Occupied West Bank — Crippled Palestinian Mayor Shaka returned home in Jerusalem Wednesday, welcomed by a cheering crowd that slaughtered a sheep on the roof of his ambulance as a sign of their joy.
 They can take my legs but not my spirit," said the 47-year-old mayor returning from Jordan where he underwent treatment after his legs were blown off in a bomb blast in his home last month.
 Crippled Israeli troops nearly ringed the city of 90,000 as the cream-colored minibus ambulance rolled down streets festooned with red, blue and yellow banners and signs praising the crippled Shaka as a hero, "our freedom fighter," and leader.
 A sheep was slaughtered on the roof of the ambulance as the traditional Arab symbol of joy as the vehicle passed hundreds of chanting, waving well-wishers into the led courtyard of Shaka's hilltop stone house.
 Blood from the sheep ran down the windshield of the ambulance and young men reached for it as they smeared themselves with it as a sign of joy at Shaka's homecoming.
 Shaka emerged as a major symbol of the West Bank of opposition to Palestinians to 13 years of Israeli rule and their fight for statehood. "If the Palestinians were killed except one woman, her children would be on the struggle," Shaka, dressed in a brown silk robe over a green galbaya, told the nearly 1,000 residents crammed into the courtyard of his home under a hot sun.

"If a pessimist, Chinese."
 What's an easy second language?
 "No such thing," the Jesuit said.
 "You don't learn a second language without hard work. I was picked up by the ears in a monastery in France and learned French — very swiftly. Everything was in French. No English spoken. It took eight months to survive and after 18 months I was good at it." Isn't that old-fashioned — what with translating machines coming on line? These are little gadgets that students hope will take the pain out of foreign language the way the pocket calculators make mathematics almost pleasant?
 "That's ridiculous," Healy said. "You can't carry around a pocket translator anymore than you can put a sunrise in your pocket."
 The commission on which Healy serves, in its report to President Carter, said:
 "Americans' scandalous incompetence in foreign languages also explains our dangerously inadequate understanding of world affairs."
 "Our schools graduate a large majority of students whose knowledge and vision stops at the American shoreline, and whose heads have been filled with astonishing misinformation."
 "In a recent published study of schoolchildren's knowledge and perceptions of other nations and peoples, over 40 percent of the 12th graders could not locate Egypt correctly, while over 20 percent were equally ignorant about the whereabouts of France or China."
 The Commission learned:
 — Only 15 percent of U.S. high school students now study a foreign language. Twenty-four percent did in 1965.
 — Only one out of 20 public high school students studies French, German or Russian beyond the second year. (Four years is considered a minimum prerequisite for useable language competence.)
 — Only eight percent of U.S. colleges and universities now require a foreign language for admission.
 — There are 10,000 English-speaking Japanese business representatives on assignment in the United States.

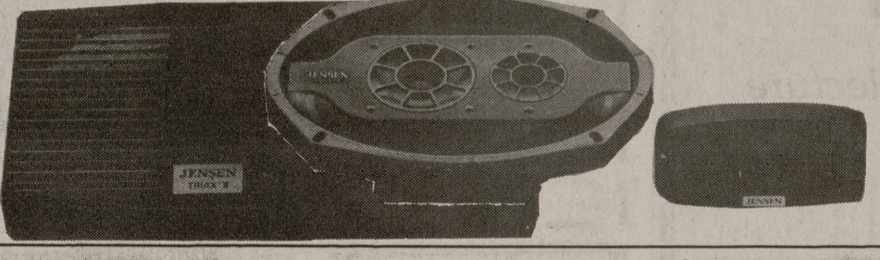

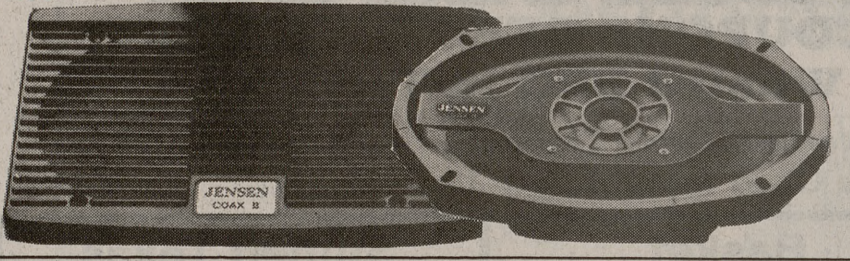
