Ags to play late

Houston athletic department offi-cials Tuesday listed their hesi-tance to ruffle the feathers of reserved ticket buyers and their desire to maintain a home field advantage as the reasons the Cougars' football game with Texas A&M may have to be play-

ed early Sunday morning.

Astrodome officials also said they feared the worst traffic jam in the stadium's 15-year history as fans leave a sold out National League championship series baseball game Saturday after-noon and collide with arriving

"We suggest that the football fans stay closely tuned to the baseball game and not start for the Astrodome until 90 minutes before kickoff," Astrodome ex-

ecutive Jimmy Fore said.

He predicted that a five-hour period needed to transform the Astrodome playing surface and stands from a baseball configuration to football would be cut to less than four hours by increased

The kickoff time will be set whenever the Houston Astros and Philadelphia Phillies complete their Saturday game, which has a 3:20 start.

Houston Athletic Director Cedric Dempsey said the football game would be played even if an extra-inning baseball game pushes his kickoff to Sunday morning.

Dempsey said "we gave some thought" to A&M's preferences to have the game moved to Rice Stadium or to Dec. 6. Those weren't accepted because "the Astrodome is our field and ... we really felt mechanically it was im-

really left mechanically it was impossible to do", he said.

Such moves would require an "equitable ticket distribution" before he would approve them.

The school revamped its priority seating in the Astrodome be-

surcharge on most yard-line sea-son tickets, irritating many longtime fans.

An NCAA record of sorts whereby two days are needed to play one game — is possible be-cause priorities of negotiators trying to work out a solution last week failed to mesh.

A&M Athletic Director Marvin Tate insisted on playing at Rice Stadium or on Dec. 6, and Sports Information Director Spec Gammon Tuesday joked, "We're changing our workouts this week to 10:30 every night to get traumatized".

A&M refused a move of the game to Friday night, saying it would inconvenience its fans.

Houston's refusal to play the football game anywhere other than the 50,000-seat Astrodome is consistent with Coach Bill Yeoman's previous actions. Requests the past four years by Texas and Texas A&M to move their games to 70,000-seat Rice Stadium were

nixed by Yeoman.

The SWC members made the Cougars play their first round of home games at 70,000 Rice Sta-

dium in 1976 and 1977 as a condi-tion of joining the SWC.
