Aggie straw vote Wednesday

The MSC Political Forum Committee will determine the Aggies' choice for the 40th president of the United States when it holds a mock election Wednesday.
The committee has sponsored straw votes each presidential election year since 1968.
The purpose of these elections, said committee chairman Sam Gillespie, is "to get an idea of the preferences of the A&M student body prior to the election and to see who it feels should lead the country."
Races and candidates appearing on the mock ballot are:
President:
Republican: Ronald Reagan/George Bush
Democrat: Jimmy Carter/Walter Mondale
Libertarian: Ed Clark/David Koch
Independent: John B. Anderson/Milton S. Eisenhower*
U.S. Representative, District 6:
Republican: Dave "Buster" Haskins
Democrat: Phil Gramm
State Senator, District 5:
Republican: N.A. McNeil
Democrat: Kent A. Caperton
*Milton Eisenhower's name appears on the Texas ballot next to John Anderson's because Anderson had to name a vice presidential candidate to get on the Texas ballot before he was ready to pick one. Patrick J. Lucey, former governor of Illinois, is Anderson's running mate.
Political Forum will run its election much like Student Government holds its elections, Gillespie said. Tables will be set up at the Dining Hall, the Commons, the Memorial Student Center and the Academic Building. Polling places will be open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.
Only Texas A&M University students will be allowed to vote and I.D. cards will be checked when the students vote to make sure no one votes more than once.
Gillespie said Political Forum will try bring in as many spokesmen for the presidential candidates as possible before the Nov. 4 election.
The committee is to host Ed Clark on Oct. 30. Gillespie said he also hopes to get Patrick Lucey to speak at Texas A&M.
Gillespie estimated 75 percent of the student body will vote for Ronald Reagan. His prediction is based on response to the Republican-oriented and Democratic-oriented programs that Political Forum has sponsored.
However, the Aggies don't always pick the winners — they favored Gerald Ford in 1976.

Grizzlies kill three at park

HELENA, Mont. — Glacier National Park officials are looking for better ways to protect thousands of park visitors from rampaging grizzly bears blamed for three deadly attacks on humans.
Three park visitors have met gruesome deaths at the jaws of grizzlies in the bloodiest season ever in the park. The toll matches that of all previous 70 years combined.
In July, a young bear rampaged through a camp, killing an Ohio man and a Minnesota woman. The killer grizzly was later identified and killed.
Earlier this month rangers discovered the remains of a Texas man killed by a grizzly. That bear has not been found.
Eight feet tall on its hind legs, the average grizzly weighs up to 800 pounds and some males even exceed 1,000 pounds. The grizzly is a biological powerhouse that develops massive strength, quickness and can run at speeds of up to 25 mph.
Park officials are reassessing policies aimed at preventing people-bear confrontations in the wake of the attacks, but experts are not sure how to manage the people-bear conflict, keeping the parks accessible to humans, but maintaining the bear ecosystem.
"It's very difficult to manage a wild animal as powerful as the grizzly bear," researcher John Craighead said. "The more people you get into an area the greater the chance of an incident."
Aggravating the problem is the increase in popularity that the bear country has enjoyed in the past decade.
"There are just too many backpackers," said University of Idaho professor Jim Peek.
As many as 200 grizzlies inhabit the 1,600-square-mile park and surrounding areas, and each can travel as far as 200 square miles.
