

Squad looks ahead to nationals

Ag debaters gain respect

Texas A&M University debate team placed third in a national debate that took place in Kansas last weekend. The George R.R. Pflaum debate, held annually at Emporia State University in Kansas, is considered one of the top five in the nation, according to Michael Selby, captain of Texas A&M's debate team this year.

The University of Pittsburg won first place and Augustana Illinois College took second. Texas A&M's third place was the highest for the Southwest Conference, placing above teams from Baylor, Texas Tech, University of Houston and University of Texas.

Selby ranked 12th speaker out of 138 contestants in the senior division.

In previous tournaments this year, the Aggie team has placed first in tournaments at Pan American University, Texas Tech and Oklahoma Christian University. The team placed fourth in a tournament at Middle Tennessee State.

At the beginning of the season, a two week seminar is held at the Arizona Debate Institute where representatives from debate teams meet, research and discuss current issues and decide which issue will be up for debate in the fall tournaments. Different aspects of the issue are researched and then debated at the tournaments.

The issue decided on for this year was the United States' foreign military commitment. The team's head coach is Wayne Kraemer, director of forensics. Selby said Kraemer and new assistant coach Bruce Daniel have helped increase the quality of the team and have been a major factor in the team's success as a result of their high quality coaching.

In previous years, Selby said, Texas A&M's team was not respected by other teams and schools in the southwest. Selby said this was due to the fact that the team was inconsistent. Students would join for a year and then quit. Now students are remaining on the team and winning tournaments.

Kraemer, who has been head coach for the debate team for two and a half years, said the reason the team has gained stability is because of increased funds for the team.

When Kraemer took over as head coach he worked with Dr. Carolyn Adair, director of student activities, and acquired increased funds for the team. The money came from bookstore funds.

Kraemer said that the increased funds, along with support from the English department and enthusiasm from "very bright" debaters who are willing to work have made the program more consistent. Selby added that Texas A&M's debate team is now gaining respect in the Southwest Conference that it formerly did not have.


