

# Ag women finish fourth Volleyball team advances

The Texas A&M women's volleyball team started out with a bang this weekend and then hung on to take fourth place in the state vol-leyball championship at G. Rollie White Coliseum.

In Friday's preliminary matches, the unseeded Aggies first met up with fourth seeded Texas Tech. The Red Raiders had dealt the Aggies two losses earlier in the season, but in front of a small home crowd, the hosts won easily. As it turned out, that victory alone qualified the Aggies for the regional tournament in Baton Rouge in two weeks. The Aggies went on to defeat North Texas State and then lost to UT-Arlington on Friday. Their two victories en-abled A&M to play in the championship bracket Saturday, consisting of the tournament's top four teams. This year, the top four were all in-vited to the regional tournament. Saturday the Aggies lost to Hous-

ton, the eventual winner, and then to Texas to wind up fourth. Head coach Terry Condon sounded con-fused in her brief synopsis of her teams' play this weekend.

"It went real well Friday," she said. "But by Saturday we played like our same old selves. I don't know whether they thought the win against Tech or just one good day would be good enough or not."

Sue Wetzel, a sophomore starter for the Aggies, said the Tech victory led to the letdown. "We were all fired up for Tech,"

the Californian said. "I guess we we're all satisfied with that, and might have let up a little."

Playing five games in two days took its toll on many of the players, and Anne Yardley, another Aggie starter, said that and a tough week of practice had everyone burned out by Saturday.

"I was really tired," she said. "We had all those games and a really hard week of practice Monday through Thursday and a large through Thursday and a lot of people were really exhausted."

Injuries to Krista Sodich and Marianna McNamara, both regulars, also hurt the A&M effort.
