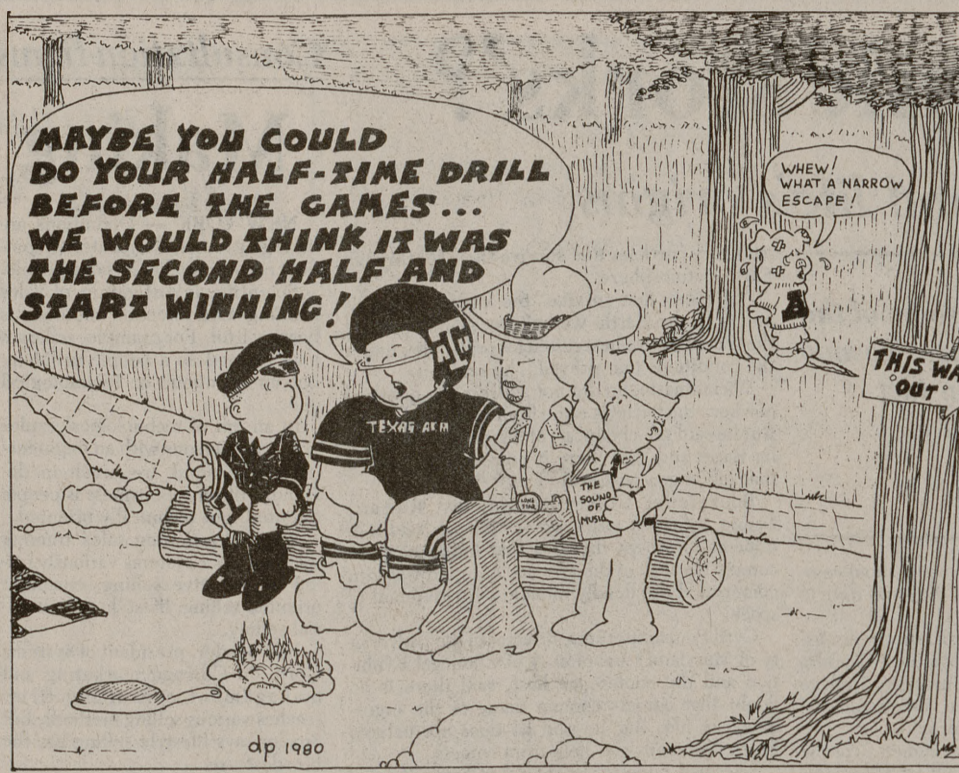

ATLANTA—Free agent Claudell Washington, who had 42 RBI and stole 17 bases in 22 attempts for the New York Mets last season, has been acquired by the Atlanta Braves.

The Braves said Friday at a news conference the 26-year-old outfielder had agreed in principle to play for the squad owned by sportsman and broadcasting executive Ted Turner. Officials said the contract will be signed soon.

Washington was the first free agent taken in this year's reentry draft to agree to contract terms with another major league team.

Terms of the agreement were not disclosed, but published reports indicated it was likely to be a five-year contract that will make Washington a millionaire.

Tom Baenziger of San Francisco, Washington's agent, said when asked whether this was one of Turner's "staggering" free-agent deals: "I would say so. Money was no object."
