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ball play-by-play broadcast in history was made of the Texas A&M-Texas game in 1921.

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First football broadcast recalled

Battalion Reporter A radio station which orginally operated as a ham system was set up at Texas A&M University in 1921, and by a chain of occurrences came to broadcast the first play-by-play foot-

ball game known in history.

The events which led to the transmission of the game was originally intended to be a stunt, said W. A. Tolson, a former Texas A&M student who was the builder and broadcaster of the transmitter as written in documents procured from the Texas

A&M University Archives.
After the war, when civilians were permitted to use ham radios, Tolson and his friend, B. Lewis Wilson, who was in charge of electrical maintenance in the electrical engineering laboratories, set out to build a ham transmitter.

In order to get a transmitter, Tolson and Wilson had to "steal" a highvoltage transformer from a professor's laboratory. The next step was to "procure" about 100 glass photographic plates from the Campus Photo Studio that were to be used as a transmitting condensor.

The third step proved to be the most difficult when Tolson and Wil-

water" - an electric fan. Here is the story as Tolson and Wilson remembered it:

"The progress of science was somewhat delayed by the adamant refusal of Professor James to allow his fan to be placed in winter storage until the weather got cool.

However, "fate intervened in the favor of science" and somehow the fan miraculously fell out of a window where "someone had carelessly placed it." Once the fan was retrieved, the only part of the object not damaged was the motor which could easily find a useful purpose as a

rotary spark gap.

The first transmitter was born at Texas A&M.

F. C. Bolton, professor of electrical engineering, got a transmitter license for the project, which carried the call letters 5YA.

Station 5YA operated as a ham re-lay until the idea came up to give a play-by-play account of the Thank-sgiving Day football game on Nov. 24, 1921 between the arch rivals, the Texas Aggies and the Texas Lon-

major problem had to be overcome.

The Morse Code system that would be used to send the game over the wires was much too slow to keep up with the action of the game. To solve the problem, the legendary Texas A&M football coach, Dana X. Bible, developed some football abbreviations which could be sent

Copies of the abbreviations were then sent to the amateur stations that would be interested in receiving the broadcast

tions are "TB A 45Y" which meant "Texas' ball on the Aggie's 45 yard line" and "T FP &Y L" which meant "Texas forward pass and yards lost.

The fans went wild as they listened to the Texas Aggies defeat the Texas Longhorns to a what may have been either a 7-0 win or a 0-0 tie, records at the archives are contradictory. If the score was 7-0, the Aggies had an "undefeated, untied, and unscored upon" season.
