COBOL developer to speak tonight

The inventor of one of the most widely-used computer languages will speak at Texas A&M University tonight at 6:30.
Navy Capt. Grace Murray Hopper, developer of the Common Business Oriented Language, COBOL, will attend an informal faculty and student reception from 3 p.m. to 4 p.m. in room 145 MSC. She will speak on the past, present and future of information processing at a banquet, sponsored by the Data Processing Management Society, at 6:30 p.m. in room 226 MSC.
Shortly after she joined the Navy

in 1945, Hopper began working with the first computer, designed in WWII. In 1949, she became a reserve Navy officer and while working for Sperry Univac, she developed COBOL in the mid-1950s.
Recalled to active duty in 1967, Hopper, 74, is reputed to be the

second-oldest living naval officer active today. She works at the Navy Data Automation Command in Washington D.C.
Hopper holds a degree in mathematics from Vassar and has several honorary university degrees in recognition of her work.

poll to determine the extent of public awareness of the school desegregation plan and attitudes about it.
The plan calls for a number of changes in the local system, including district changes, pairing of some schools and expansion of the magnet school program to 30 schools.
Trial on whether to adopt the school board's plan or implement Justice Department proposal calling for massive crosstown busing is scheduled to begin March 4 before U.S. District Judge John Parker.
Some 49 percent of those familiar with the plan said they thought it would lower the quality of education in the parish, while 28 percent said they felt the standards would remain the same. Only 14 percent of those familiar with the proposal said public education would be improved by it.
The poll broke down the responses to the question by race, with 54 percent of the whites saying the plan would make schools worse, 27 percent saying they would remain the same and only 12 percent saying they would be better. Eight percent said they had no opinion.
Even among nonwhites, 27 percent of the people claiming familiarity said the plan would make things worse, as opposed to 25 percent who said it would improve education. Thirty-four percent of the nonwhites said there would be no change, and 15 percent said they had no opinion.
Pollster Roy Brady said the poll's finding that about one-third of the voters in East Baton Rouge Parish were unfamiliar with the desegregation plan was not particularly surprising.
"However, among those respondents who have children in public school, or will have next year, only 15 percent say they are not familiar with the school board's plan," he said. "Of those who say they are not familiar with the plan, 86 percent do not have children in public school."



Marshals in bind because of job freeze

BROWNSVILLE — President Reagan's freeze on federal hiring may hit the U.S. Marshal's Service in the Southern District of Texas in a spot that already is sore.
The backlog of fugitive warrants is growing, but the number of sworn deputies to serve the warrants has decreased by one-fourth during the last several years.
Southern District officials had hoped to hire five more deputies this year, including one for Brownsville, but the president's freeze on hires all but dashed hopes of filling the jobs.
The Southern District, a triangle that extends from Houston, to Brownsville to Laredo, has a particularly high fugitive rate because of its rural and urban makeup and its proximity to the Mexican border, said Thomas Kupferer, chief of enforcement operations for the U.S. Marshal's office.
"We have 232 people in Brownsville that we are actively seeking," Kupferer said. "Three-quarters of them probably are not in Texas or the United States."

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
