WASHINGTON — Consumers
are surprising financial experts by significantly increasing retail purchases despite interest rates and uncertainty about President Reagan's still-secret economic

A Commerce Department re-port released Wednesday showed cars to garden supplies rose to \$184 billion in January, a 9 percent cent. increase over December.




