tery every year," Mears said. Many of the members said that vith such a policy it would be very difficult to elect a dorm council when the students didn't even know if they would be living in the dorm the following year.

Balcar announced that the Quonset Huts are being turned over from the Department of Stu-dent Affairs to the Department of Student Activities and that they would soon receive a "overhaul. In addition to general improvements, plans are being made to add a football field, basketball court, and a pavillion.

Blatchley said the cost of the project would be one-quarter to one-half million dollars. "I think we'll be able to secure some funds from former students," he said.
