PUF backed by UT regents

AUSTIN — Three new members of the University of Texas Board of Regents, testifying before a Senate subcommittee today, were reluctant to commit themselves to spreading the rich fund that UT and Texas A&M share to other Texas colleges and universities.
"I would want to see the figures on what the schools would receive and how it would be used before I would commit myself to dividing the (Permanent University) Fund," former Texas first lady Janey Briscoe, just appointed to the board by Gov. Bill Clements, told the Nominations Subcommittee. "I truly have an open mind."
Beryl Buckley Milburn complained that she has been quoted incorrectly as favoring extension of the fund to all public colleges and universities in the state.
"It probably should be expanded to include component elements of the system (UT and A&M systems)," she said, "and not extended to other institutions outside the system."
The third new regent, Tom B. Rhodes of Dallas, said he does "not much feel there would be enough money in that fund for use outside the system."
The new regents all agreed that the University of Texas and Texas A&M, at least, should be "institutions of excellence" and that they are not yet.
The new regents, all appointed by Gov. Clements, were asked what areas of waste they have seen in the University of Texas system that might be cut out. Clements has asked for cuts in spending and employment in all state government and in public higher education.
"I certainly have not (seen waste), with the possible exception of trying to curb to some extent building programs," Rhodes said. "There may not be enough money to sponsor these dual role type buildings."
Some schools, he said, want to build auditoriums that will be the town as well as the university. Milburn mentioned only a few areas of waste, "institutions with dwindling enrollments."
"Cutting down is very tough in human terms, when you have people who have devoted their lives to an institution who are needed anymore," she said. "That's the only area I can see."
Briscoe expressed a great deal of humility about her new job on the board of regents. "I'm at an advantage because I have no background in higher education," she said. "It took me some time to learn what the PUF fund was and how it was used."
The subcommittee recommended confirmation of all the appointments.

Peso devaluing case sets state precedent

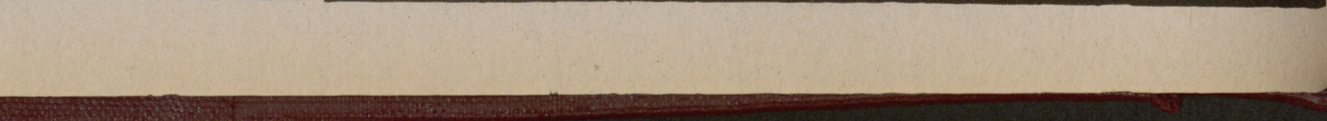

AUSTIN — The Texas Supreme Court, in the first case of its type in Texas, ruled Austin National Bank is entitled to reduce the amount of a certificate of deposit purchased by Vicente Athie Romo and Griesel Athie Calzada.
The two bought a \$45,000 certificate of deposit on Aug. 25, 1976, and paid for it with a check for 562,500 pesos drawn on Banco Nacional de Mexico. The rate of exchange at the time was 13 pesos per dollar.
Before the check was honored by the Mexican bank, the peso devalued, and the check was worth only \$27,463.87 in U.S. funds.
The bank issued a new certificate of deposit in that amount. Romo filed suit against the bank, contending his original check had been accepted as full payment of the \$45,000 certificate of deposit.
