## Any state redistricting plan may bring litigation

**AUSTIN** — Any redistricting plan approved by the Legislature will undoubtedly face court challenges, and lawmakers' conversations with staff members or lobbyists could be used as evidence, a legal expert told state senators.

Steve Bickerstaff, retained by the Legislature since 1979 to study legal ramifications of redistricting, advised lawmakers on possible legal action Tuesday.

"There is no area of legislative activity where the legal problems are more complex or that is more fraught with error," he said. "It is a virtual certainty that whatever action the Legislature takes will be litigated."

The Senate met for the first time Tuesday as a committee of the whole to discuss redistricting. The Senate also heard a report on preparations by the Legislative Council to handle redistricting bills.

Bickerstaff told the Senate areas of interest could be considered, but population is the primary criteria in drafting new districts.

"The bottom line is who will draw the districts whether they will be drawn by you (the Senate) or whether they will be drawn by the federal courts," he said. "What is most important to a member is that population must be the controlling criteria."

Bickerstaff said the courts will apply a strict standard for congressional districts than for state legislative districts.

Sen. Tati Santiesteban, D-El Paso, designated by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby to serve as chairman of the redistricting committee, said public hearings on redistricting may be delayed until final census figures are received.

## Bear debaters find cards

**WACO** — Members of the Baylor University debate squad have vowed to keep their materials under lock and key, following the theft of six cases of debate evidence.

The theft of the 12,000 note cards and 1,000 pages of briefs

caused Baylor to drop out of last weekend's Heart of America debate tournament at the University of Kansas.

Debate squad coach Dr. William English says whoever took the materials was familiar with debate.

"It was obviously somebody involved in debate," English said Tuesday. "It was no coincidence. Whoever it was had to know where our debater lived and to pick those six cases out of the 12 or 15 in the room."

The cases were stolen March 3 from the debate squad room in Castellaw Communication Center on the Baylor campus. The stolen notes belonged to Baylor's top two teams and concerned national defense, English said.

The materials were found about

noon Monday in the parking lot of debater Bill Fouche's apartment complex.

"We can pretty well pinpoint the time they were returned," English said. "Bill left his apartment about 11:20 a.m. to come here at 12:15 p.m. his roommate called. He had gone out to check the cases when he saw the cases."

A number of Baylor students canceled their spring break week, working to replace the stolen material through research at Texas A&M University and University of Texas.

The effort was called off when the notes were found, English said. "If anything good has come out of this it's that our friends' colleagues have shown their concern."

## RHA plans events, workshop for May

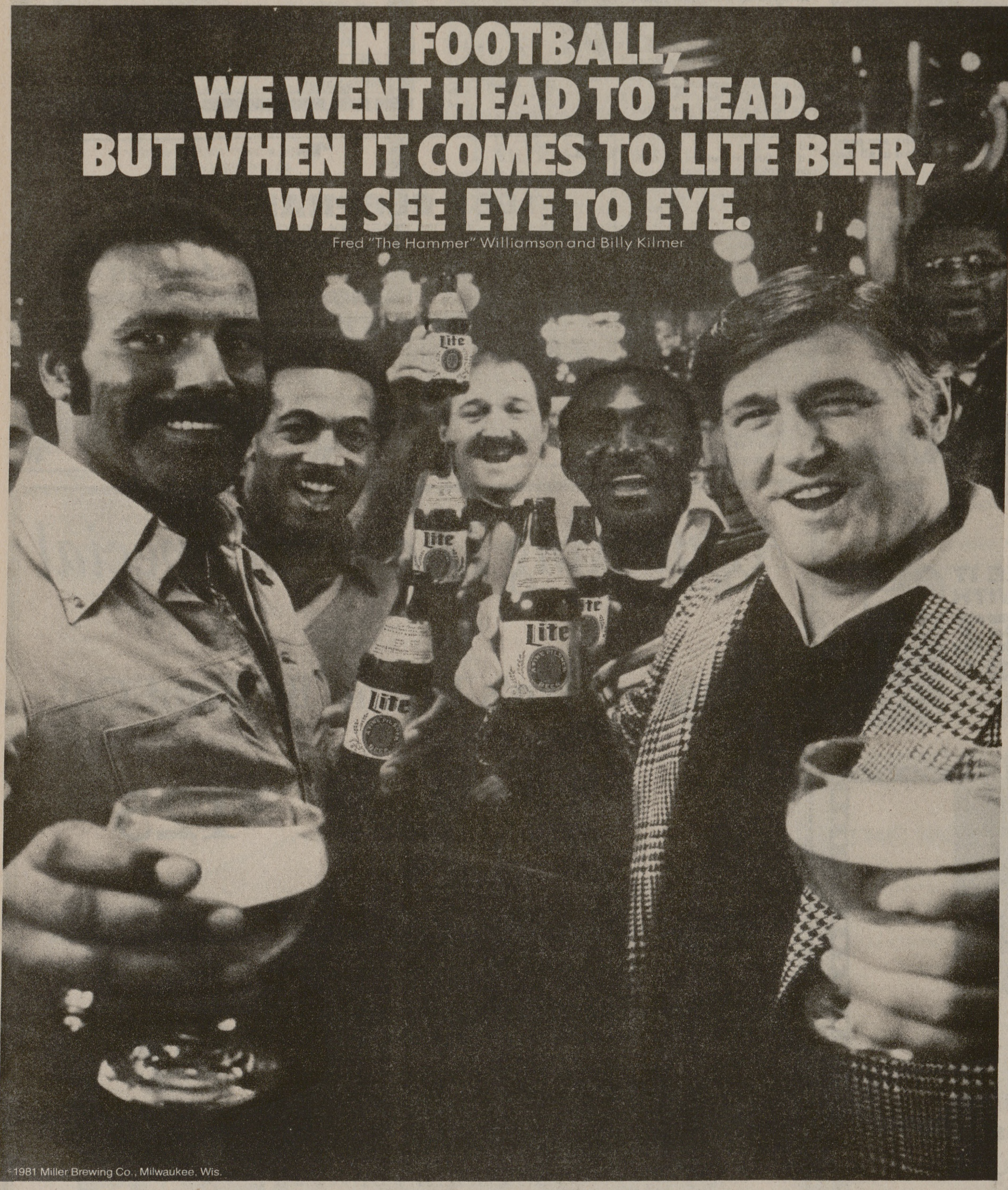
The Residence Halls Association's upcoming major events will be discussed at their meeting in 209 Harrington at 7 tonight.
